It was a proud day for Cayman Airways, as the new Boeing 737 Max 8 aircraft took off from Owen Roberts International Airport to Denver, Colorado, for the longest ever commercial nonstop flight in its 50-year history. But first, of course, there was a ribbon-cutting ceremony, with smart Cayman Airways crew members, looking magnificent, and with David White, Councilor for Sports and Tourism present, on behalf of Minister for Tourism, the Hon. Moses Kirkconnell: "This is another historic milestone in the life of our National Airline," Mr White said, "As well as being the longest commercial flight ever offered by Cayman Airways, this new route on our brand new Boeing 737 Max 8 aircraft will allow the Cayman Islands to reach further into the West Coast of the United States, opening up a whole new world of possibilities for our tourism industry."

It will be a whole lot different than Cayman, there will be new scenery and I will meet new people," she said. Keanu 17 is a swimmer who will be competing in the 50 and 100m events: "I'm looking forward to it. I've never been to Abu Dhabi in my life," he said. "I'm going up to swim for Miss Penny," he added referring to their team's swimming coach who sadly passed away last year.

After they had all lined up for a big group photo, along with the Governor, and with their coaches and Committee members and everyone who has helped make this dream come true, the Governor said a few words: "I wanted to have an opportunity to send you my best wishes and wish you every success. It is

the first time that it's ever been held in Abu Dhabi so I am sure you are all going to have a fantastic time and I know that you are representing lots of different sports; athletics, swimming and basketball. I even had to look one up today, bocce – I didn't know what bocce was," he said.

Understanding Generation K

The next generation of consumers – i.e. people between the ages of 15 and 24 - have a huge Euro150 billion in Europe and USD200 billion at their disposal and ought to be paid attention to, if businesses are to succeed in the future. This was the view of Noreena Hertz, speaker at this year's Royal Fidelity Cayman Economic Outlook Conference, held last week at the Kimpton Seafire. Ms Hertz said she had been studying this generation in detail for the past five years.

Ms Hertz, an author and commentator who, among other roles, advises world leaders on strategy, economic and geo political risk and artificial intelligence, called this generation of new consumers Generation K, after the feisty lead character Katniss Everdeen in the Hunger Games movies.

In three years this generation would be making up one third of the world's workforce and so it was important for businesses to understand how they differed from the previous generation of millennials (i.e. people who became adults in the early 21st Century).

"If you want to engage with this generation today and in the future it's essential you understand who they are, what they want and what they value," she said.

Generation K had been fundamentally shaped by technology and spent a third of their day on social media and online, but technology had not been the only thing to shape them, Ms Hertz said. They were also shaped by the worst recession in recent years, coming of age during the financial crisis of 2008.

"In most cases they've witnessed their families tightening their belts relatives or family friends who have lost their homes or their jobs," Ms Hertz said.

This generation had grown up in the shadow of economic decline, job insecurity and a lack of financial optimism. They had also been shaped by existential threats forged by the Manchester and Paris terrorist attacks, the rise of Al Qaeda and Isis they had experienced terrorist attacks and school shootings in many of their home cities, whether Amsterdam, Barcelona or Birmingham.

"This cohort has had terrorism, brutality and danger piped into their smartphones in a way that has never before been experienced," she confirmed. "It's not that the world is objectively more dangerous today; it's that this generation experiences danger in a fundamentally different way, constantly, repeatedly, 24/7."

Mental health in decline

Because this generation saw the world as unequal and harsh, the impact was being felt by them to such an extent that they were profoundly anxious. Ms Hertz pointed to the statistics that in the US more than one in five high school students had contemplated suicide, and in the UK there had been a threefold increase in the number of teenagers who

"Indeed, in almost every recent global study there has been a marked deterioration in the mental health of this generation, both by boys and girls, compared to a decade ago," she said.

Ms Hertz said that it wasn't that they were just worried about boyfriends/

girlfriends, etc., they were also really anxious about big global issues such as global poverty, global hunger and climate change. Eighty per cent were very concerned about climate change and there were remarkable scenes in the UK last month when an estimated 15,000 school-children walked out of school to join a nationwide climate change strike, she said.

This generation was very worried about the future state of the world and they did not believe politicians were addressing their concerns.

"I cannot overstate how worried they are about their future financial security. This generation believes their economic future will be significantly worse than that of their parents," Ms Hertz stated.

This generation also didn't believe in big corporations to do the right thing, with only six per cent believing in big corporations.

"The social contract between generation K and corporations has broken down completely and this will affect who they buy from, where they work and where they put their money.," she advised

This generation campaigns more and volunteers more than any previous generation. What they care about the most was equality.

"Economic, racial and social equality, gender equality. This generation believes equality is a birthright and discrimination is a taboo," Ms Hertz said, asking the audience to think about how their organisation's actions and values resonate with this generation.

"Are you doing enough on diversity, sustainability, the community to speak

to them in their terms and are you communicating it enough?" she questioned.

Generation K was also putting a premium on things that they could create. They were a generation of creators and makers. They didn't want just to buy, they wanted to experience and put their own stamp on things.

Ms Hertz said that she wanted to open up the audience's minds to these traits because they needed to be firmly on people's radars if they were going to attract and engage this generation as employees, consumers or investors over the coming years.





BETTER SLEEP – BETTER HEALTH

Millions of people worldwide do not get sufficient sleep nor enough sleep. Our daily routine is fast paced and very stressful. Sleep quality is important because not all sleep is created equally. Not because you get 8 hours sleep at night means you are getting a good night's sleep. The Democratic Parliament: the How and Why

In this column I advance the view that a democratic parliament, characterized by transparency, representativeness, accountability, effectiveness and accessibility, is best able to meet the needs of citizens which includes the advancement of integrity in public and private life.

Drawing from the work of Professor Manuel Balan and also David Beethan's **Parliaments and Democracy in the 21st Century**, I propose, certainly not exhaustive, specific indicators that can be used to measure the extent to which these characteristics are actually present.

There is a common myth held by some, that the fact a parliament was voted in, is a sufficient indicator of its democratic credentials. If this were so, then democracy would only be limited to the act of voting in representatives who then can govern without regard to the wishes and desires of the people.

However, the democratic idea goes far beyond the mere act of voting. There are two fundamental premises of democracy. The first is that the members of any group or association should have the determining influence and control over its rules and policies, through their participation in deliberations about the common interest.

The second is that in doing so they should treat each other, and be treated, as equals. These principles, properly applied, explain why many believe that democratic systems are superior to other forms of governments in their ability to manage and deliver on the desires and needs of the citizenry.

Beethan asserts that a democratic parliament has five key characteristics. They should be representative, transparent, accessible, accountable and effective.

Representativeness has to do with being socially and politically representative of the diversity of the people and ensuring equal opportunities and protections for all its members. Transparency means the extent to which Parliament is open to its people in the conduct of its business. Accessibility of parliament concerns the involvement of the public, including the associations and interest groups in the society- the involvement of civil society in the work of parliament.

Accountability speaks to the extent to which members of parliament are being answerable to the electorate for their performance in office and equally important, their integrity of conduct. The fifth, effectiveness, refers to the level at which parliament conducts its business in accordance with these democratic values, and the performance of the legislative and oversight functions of parliament in a manner that serves the needs of the entire population.

One of the most important characteristic of a democratic parliament is undoubtedly transparency. A government, which is open, is much less likely to be corrupt especially when citizens have access to information whether of proceedings or to documents. It is vital that as far as is possible, all of government functions be open to scrutiny.

We can tell the extent to which a parliament is transparent. A transparent parliament believes in maximum exposure and provides for freedom of information within the constitution itself. Other measurements of how open and transparent a government is include proceedings open to the public; openness to press and broadcasting personnel; facilitates journalists and other media in reporting the activities of par-

liament; encourages freedom of expression; live parliamentary debates; parliamentary websites, which are constantly updated, etcetera.

Having explored the importance of transparency, I now consider the fact of participation and representativeness. Balan explains that:

'The participation of the population is key in influencing and controlling government action, as people become increasingly involved in shaping the priorities of government and policymaking, in resource allocation, and in access to public goods and services.'

A flourishing democracy needs free and fair electoral systems and processes but it also needs its parliament to be representative. A representative democracy, explains Beethan, has mechanisms to ensure the rights of the political opposition and other political groups, and to allow all members to exercise their mandates freely and without being subjected to undue influence and pressure.


As useful as democracy is, even the Athenians who invented it had to deal with the issue of the other side. In any election, a significant portion of voters would not have voted for the government and a country can become ungovernable if it lacks representativeness.

A parliament's level of representativeness can be measured by the number of women representativeness; minority representation; use of the second chamber for greater representation and inclusion and the inclusiveness of oversight committees.

It can also be measured by the extent to which chairs for specific committees are given to the opposition or minority members; the ability of backbenchers to introduce private bills; the involvement of civil society and other people's movements in the work of parliament; pre-legislative scrutiny by the public; public right of petition, etcetera.

A third characteristic of a democratic government related to its ability to deliver and promote integrity in doing so, is accountability. Balan defines accountability as 'The ability to ensure that public officials are both answerable, having to justify and inform the citizenry, as well as responsible for their behavior and having to eventually be sanctioned for violations.' He explains further that:

'Through accountability, public officials and their representatives are held to standards of conduct that are clear-

ly in the public interest. This requires rules of conduct that are transparent, straightforward and broadly accepted in society, as well as administrative and legal processes to discipline or remove

officials who do not respect such rules.'
He explains that when people know that their actions are being scrutinized, they know that they cannot get away with improper behavior. Hence, independent and thorough oversight of state actions is crucial in promoting integrity and probity in public life. This is a responsibility shared by the citizenry and government institutions, including parliament.'

The following rather lengthy quote from Balan details the importance of accountability and ways to accomplish this.

'Parliament's oversight role includes mechanisms such as questioning ministers about their activities and priorities, to holding ministers accountable for any failures to implement the access to information law in their ministries, to maintaining the national budget. Parliament has an opportunity to play an oversight role with the independent administrative bodies and can play a leading role with respect to appointments and funding of government bodies. Oversight involves monitoring the appointment process of officials to ensure that government is conducted in a transparent and ethical manner.'



Barbados Denies Report of Measles Outbreak

The Ministry of Health and Wellness has denied a local media report that the island is experiencing a measles out-

In fact, said Senior Medical Officer of Health Dr Karen Broome, Barbados has not documented a case of measles since

A local online news website last Friday quoted Director of PAREDOS, Sheila Stuart as saying that "The Ministry of Health sent four inspectors to check those green cards for immunization purposes because we have a measles outbreak in Barbados".

However, the Ministry said it is simply conducting a review of vaccination records of children in nurseries and day care centres throughout the island to ensure they are up-to-date, in order to prevent an outbreak.

"The Ministry of Health and Wellness advises that measles can be prevented once children receive two doses of the MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccine which in Barbados is administered at ages 12 months and 18 months. If your child has not been vaccinated, you are advised to contact your health care provider immediately," it said.

Outbreaks of measles continue to be reported in North America, the United Kingdom, Europe and the Americas. 🏈

No Illegal Connections to Jamaica Oil Refinery's Underwater Pipelines

Minister of Science, Energy and Technology Fayval Williams says a recent dive mission conducted by members of the Jamaica Defence Force (JDF) Coast Guard has identified no illegal attachments to Petrojam's underwater petroleum pipelines.

The mission was requested by Prime MinisterAndrew Holness.

Speaking at a press conference at the State-owned oil refinery's premises on Marcus Garvey Drive in Kingston today, Williams said the Ministry is in receipt of a letter dated February 22, indicating the dates of the dive mission and the other technical aspects of their dive.

"The letter indicated that there were no illegal attachments identified on any of the 23 pipelines surveyed," she noted.

Acting Commanding Officer, JDF Coast Guard, Lt. Commander Aceion Prescott said that the extensive diving operation was conducted over a five-day period to assess the status of the pipelines.

He said the operation was conducted with approximately 14 divers and took place on a daily basis, "because the Kingston Harbour is not the (simplest) place to dive, and we needed to ensure that we did a very comprehensive job".

"So, all the pipelines were surveyed visually and by hand, where the divers basically felt along the pipeline to detect any anomaly or any attachment. At the end of the period, they were assessed as having no illegal attachments or any indication of any such attachment during the period of our investigation," Prescott noted.

In the meantime, Minister Williams said investigations are being carried out by the Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF) to clamp down on illicit petroleum operations. 😚

ble outbreaks of dengue. The disease is endemic in the region and, since its reintroduction in the 1980s, has caused cyclical outbreaks and epidemics every three to five years. The first dengue epidemic with over one million cases occurred in the Americas in 2010. Three years later, in 2013, the first epidemic with more than two million cases occurred. At the beginning of 2019, there was an increase in cases compared to the same period of 2018, PAHO said.

"Dengue is a viral infection transmitted by mosquitoes that is widespread in the Americas," said Dr Marcos Espinal, Director of the Department of Communicable Diseases and Environmental Determinants of Health. "Its complexity has been increasing over the years due to several factors such as unplanned urban growth, water and sanitation problems, climate change, and, in some countries, the simultaneous circulation of all four types of dengue, which increases the risk of serious cases and outbreaks."

According to PAHO's latest epidemiological update on dengue, published on February 22, 560,586 cases of dengue were reported in the Americas last year, including 3535 severe cases of dengue and 336 deaths. During the first six weeks of 2019, almost 100,000 cases of dengue were reported, including 632 cases of severe dengue and 28 deaths.

The main recommendations from PAHO focus on countries intensifying disease surveillance, as well as vector control measures to reduce mosquito populations that transmit the disease. Currently, the only way to control or prevent the transmission of the virus is

the fight against Aedes aegypti, the main

mosquito vector. PAHO also recommends continuing to educate the population, as well as community involvement initiatives. PAHO also requests that countries ensure that health professionals are trained in the diagnosis of dengue and other arboviruses, as well as in the adequate management of patients with these diseases. PAHO provides technical cooperation to prevent and control the disease.

Dr Espinal explained that the timely diagnosis of the disease has become more complex with the arrival of two new arboviruses: the Chikungunya virus in 2013 and the Zika virus in 2015, which present similar symptomatology. However, despite the introduction of these new arboviruses, dengue is the one that presents the highest number of diseases.

Dengue is also a more lethal arbovirus than chikungunya and Zika, but its treatment is relatively simple, inexpensive and very effective in saving lives, PAHO noted.

"The key is recognizing the warning signs early and providing the care required to prevent it progressing to more serious forms," said José Luis San Martin, PAHO's regional advisor on dengue.

If a physician is not sure whether a patient is presenting with dengue, Chikungunya or Zika, PAHO recommends that the clinical management and treatment of dengue begin immediately, without waiting for a laboratory diagnosis. PAHO also recommends that the patient be monitored daily or at least every 48 hours in order to pick up on any serious warning signs, particularly during the critical phase of the disease.

Trudeau under pressure over scandal

Canada's Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's chances of another term looks bleak when the general elections are held later this year look in serious jeopardy after a second minister resigned from his cabinet over a scandal about alleged corruption at a major Canadian company.

Jane Philpott quit as Treasury Board president on Monday, telling the Mr Trudeau she had "lost confidence in how the government has dealt with this matter".

Ministers and government officials are accused of having pressured Ms Philpott's friend, former attorney general and justice minister Jody Wilson-Raybould, not to prosecute engineering firm SNC-Lavalin.

Ms Wilson-Raybould, who stepped down last month, told Canada's parliament that the director of public prosecutions urged her to negotiate a financial settlement with SNC-Lavalin.

The company is accused of having paid C\$48 million (KY\$30m) to the Gaddafi family between 2001 and 2011 to win Libyan government contracts.

The proposed remediation deal would see the company fined but avoid a bribery and corruption trial, which could see it banned from competing for government business for a decade.

When Mr Trudeau led the Liberals to victory in the election in October 2015, he called himself a feminist, promised to improve Canada's troubled relations with indigenous peoples and pledged to conduct an open and transparent government. These promises look empty after Ms Wilson-Raybould, an indigenous politician, told the parliamentary justice committee investigating the affair on Feb 27 that the prime minister and his officials had tried to strong-arm her. The most senior bureaucrat in Ottawa issued "veiled threats" of what would happen if she did not change her mind, she testified. 🏈

Measles kills Filipino kids

The Philippines is enduring a deadly measles epidemic which has infected almost 15,000 people and recorded hundreds of deaths.

Philippines Health Department Undersecretary Eric Domingo said 14,938 cases have been recorded and 238 deaths reported a week ago, but the number of cases is still rising.

"We are continuing with our intensive campaign to vaccinate the vulnerable unprotected children," Mr Domingo said.

The Philippines declared a measles outbreak in Manila in early February. Infections had spiked by more than 1,000 percent in January compared to

infections last year, officials said. By mid-February there were 8,400 cases and 136 deaths. About half of

those deaths were children aged 1 to 4 and many of those who died hadn't been vaccinated.

The outbreak is blamed, in part, on public distrust of the government's immunisation programme, which was tarnished in 2017 over an anti-dengue vaccine that was linked to the deaths of at least three children. Measles is a highly contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus which can be spread through sneezing, coughing and close personal contact.

Complications include diarrhoea, ear infections, pneumonia and encephalitis, or the swelling of the brain, which may lead to death.

The drug Dengvaxia was banned by the Food and Drug Administration of the Philippines last month. The programme was halted after a study found that the vaccine might increase the risks of severe dengue infection. By then more than 830,000 children had already been given the vaccine.

Another immunisation drive to fight the measles was started in Manila two weeks ago in the hopes of containing the outbreak by April, Philippines Health Secretary Francisco Duque III said at the time.

In a one-week period, 130,000 of 450,000 people targeted for anti-measles vaccinations were immunised, Mr Duque said. 😚

Honduran officials accused in Caceres killing

Prosecutors in Honduras say government officials and representatives of a controversial hydroelectric project conspired to get the dam approved.

Honduran prosecutors working with an anti-corruption mission from the Organisation of American States say that 16 former government officials and ex-representatives of the dam's developer Desarrollos Energeticos, DESA, could face fraud-related charges.

Investigators said Monday they worked from legal complaints filed by environmental and indigenous rights activist Berta Caceres, who was murdered in 2016. She had led the fight against the dam.

In November, a court found seven people guilty of participating in Ms Caceres' murder.

Last month, prosecutors announced charges against former DESA executive Roberto David Castillo Mejia as an alleged mastermind of the killing. Mr Castillo was also named in Monday's announced case.

DESA has denied any connection to Ms Caceres' slaying. Sunday, March 3 was the third anniversary of her mur-

der. She was shot by a group of gunmen in her home in the town of Esperanza. The year before she was killed, Ms Caceres won the Goldman Environmental Prize for her grassroots campaign to pressure the world's largest dam builder to pull out of the Agua Zarca dam. A criminal court in Honduras convicted eight men for having participated in the murder. Some had ties to the military and to the notorious US military training school that went by the name School of the Americas. The trial, however, took place under a cloud of suspicion of coverups and irregularities. 😚

Cuba's solar energy surge

Cuba is using solar energy to significantly reduce its reliance on fossil fuel. Cuba is committed to reducing its fossil fuel use by turning year-round sunshine into an abundance of clean energy.

The island is already home to some 60 solar farms and the government plans to build more in the country where solar irradiance - the power per unit area received from the sun - reaches 1,825 kilowatt hours per square meter, above the world average.

Cuba is manufacturing solar panels at the Electronic Components Company in

westernmost Pinar del Rio province. In Cuba, "producing a kilowatt (of electricity) from the sun costs from six radura 2 in eastern Las Tunas province. to seven US cents, cheaper than with conventional fuel, which costs between 15 and 20 cents," said solar power expert Daniel Stolik, a professor at the University of Havana.

Converting the nation's energy production into renewable sources is one of the pillars of the government's economic reform programme, which aims to cut costly fuel imports.

Cuba's existing renewable energy sources together with newly built facil-

ities are expected to generate more than 1,100 gigawatts this year.

Currently under construction are two solar farms, La Herradura 1 and La Her-

Another four solar farms have been completed in the provinces of Villa Clara, Holguin and Granma, all connected to the national grid, and 19 more are planned.

According to the government's plan to expand renewable energy capacity, by 2030, clean energy should represent 24 percent of power generated in Cuba.

The solar irradiance Cuba's land surface receives is equal to the amount of energy produced by 50 million tons of

UK patient with HIV 'cured'

A UK patient's HIV has become "undetectable" following a stem cell transplant - in only the second case of its kind, doctors report. It raises hopes that a cure for HIV could soon be available.

The London patient, who was being treated for cancer, has now been in remission from HIV for 18 months and is no longer taking HIV drugs.

The researchers say it is too early to say the patient is "cured" of HIV.

Experts say the approach is not practical for treating most people with HIV but may one day help find a cure.

The male London patient, who has not been named, was diagnosed with HIV in 2003 and advanced Hodgkin's lymphoma in 2012.

He had chemotherapy to treat the Hodgkin's cancer and, in addition, stem cells were implanted into the patient from a donor resistant to HIV, leading to both his cancer and HIV going into re-

Researchers from University College London, Imperial College London, Cambridge and Oxford Universities were all involved in the case.

This is the second time a patient treated this way has ended up in remission

from HIV. Ten years ago, another patient in Berlin received a bone-marrow transplant

from a donor with natural immunity to the virus.

Timothy Brown, said to be the first person to "beat" HIV/Aids, was given two transplants and total body irradiation (radiotherapy) for leukaemia - a much more aggressive treatment.

"By achieving remission in a second patient using a similar approach, we have shown that the Berlin patient was not an anomaly and that it really was the treatment approaches that eliminated HIV in these two people," said lead study author Prof Ravindra Gupta, from UCL.

Although the finding is exciting, it is not offering up a new treatment for the millions of people around the world living with HIV.

The aggressive therapy was primarily used to treat the patient's cancer, not his HIV. 😚

Guaidó poised to be president

Venezuela's self-declared interim leader Juan Guaidó is rallying his supporters in the capital, Caracas, to attend a rally on Saturday as he campaigns to become president.

Although he faces arrest after defying a Supreme Court-imposed travel ban to leave the country and lobby for international help, he has returned in defiance.

"They threatened us and here we are, putting forward our face for Ven-

ezuela," he told a huge rally on his ar-

Mr Guaidó has called on President Nicolás Maduro to resign. The two men have been at loggerheads for weeks.

Mr Guaidó - who heads the opposition-led National Assembly and proclaimed himself Venezuela's acting president after the legislature declared Mr Maduro's May 2018 re-election illegitimate - has been recognised by more than 50 countries. Mr Maduro, who is backed by China, Russia and Cuba, insists he is the only legitimate president.

Venezuela's political crisis has been sparked by an economic meltdown in which hyperinflation has hit salaries and savings, leading many to flee the country.

Mr Guaidó was received at the Simón Bolivar International airport by diplomats from the US and EU nations and a crowd of supporters who chanted "Guaidó, Guaidó" and "Yes we can".

After saying that he had been threatened with "jail, death" before his return, Mr Guaidó said he had been treated well on his arrival at the airport. He said immigration officers even greeted him at the airport with the words "welcome, president".

He called for nationwide protests on Saturday.

"On Saturday we'll continue in the streets, all of Venezuela will return to the streets, decided and determined to mobilise in search of their freedom. We will not rest one second until freedom is achieved."


He believed the play would appeal to a wide-ranging audience because it is about familiar themes that affect everyone in our family and social relationships.

Harden is defenders' headache

Limiting James Harden's prodigious offensive output is the biggest defensive challenge in the NBA today. He is a gifted scorer, outstanding passer, creative shot-maker and playmaker, master of the step back 3-pointer and a great finisher at the rim. He is also unorthodox with his moves and adept at maximising the rules to his benefit, especially drawing fouls.

"Well, it's not very fun," Golden State's Klay Thompson said of the challenge.

"You're in a lose, lose, lose situation with him," Washington's Bradley Beal said.

At 36.6 points per game in 2018-19, Harden can boast that only Wilt Chamberlain and Michael Jordan have averaged more.

He's doing things Jordan and Kobe Bryant never did and rivalling what Chamberlain did. Harden's streak of 32 consecutive games with at least 30 points, which has just ended, is second to Chamberlain.

He has loads more scoring records too.

So, how do you stop, or rather, limit Harden?
For Paul George, who is a Defensive Player of the Year candidate, it is a paradox.

In a Lakers-Rockets game earlier this season, the Lakers used unorthodox methods to defend Harden. Josh Hart held his hands behind his back while guarding Harden to show referees he wasn't using his hands.

"For us, we went to the extreme, putting our hands behind our backs like they were tied, but he's a tough guard," Kuzma said.

Not only is guarding Harden difficult, so is officiating him. He has a penchant for putting defenders in compromising positions and has tricks up his sleeve to draw fouls. It requires a discerning whistle to officiate Harden.

Playing in the Eastern Conference, Beal must face Harden just twice a season.

"As many tough shots as he's going to make, sometimes you just have to pat him on the butt and keep moving," Beal said.

"You just have to make it difficult for him."

What does that mean?

Be physical, but not too physical. Don't give him too much space, but don't crowd him either. It's beneficial to have strong help defense from a big man at the rim and to be able to double-team and get the ball out of his hands.

"You really can't get close to him because he's quick enough and strong enough to get by you," Washington's Trevor Ariza said. "You can't give him too much space because he can shoot. There's no secret. You just have to do what you can and live (with) the results."

Understanding his game is one thing. Stopping it is another.

Harper's \$330m looks ludicrous

Bryce Harper has just set the bar for sports contracts in North America - \$330 million. That's how much the 26-year-old outfielder will get from the Philadelphia Phillies in a 13-year deal, making it not just the biggest contract in Major League Baseball but on the continent as well. His annual salary will be \$25.4 million.

Harper leaves the Washington Nationals, the team that brought him to the majors in 2012 as a teenager. Harper has a .279 career average with 184 homers and 521 RBIs. His deal surpasses the \$325 million received by Giancarlo Stanton of the Miami Marlins in 2015, also over 13 years.

It's not surprising that the Phillies were the team to land Harper. In a

move surely regretted in later negotiations, Phillies owner John Middleton clearly stated the team's intent to acquire top level talent in the offseason, no matter the cost. "We're going into this expecting to spend money, Middleton said in November, "and maybe even be a little bit stupid about it."

But, for baseball, the concern hasn't been over paying stupid money, but rather for paying stupid money for a stupid amount of time. Risk averse teams are increasingly reluctant to hand out large sums of money to players they don't believe will deliver on the goods years down the line. Why? Well, 13 years is a long-time and life happens, namely injuries. Recent free agent history is full of such cautionary tales.

Taylor mentors young guns

Jerome Taylor, now considered a cricket veteran, says he enjoys the role of mentoring younger players around the region.

The 34-year-old fast bowler, who last played for the West Indies in January 2018 in a Twenty20 match away to New Zealand, has been impressive in this season's regional four-day tournament for Jamaica Scorpions.

He claimed 7-50 to help the Scorpions to an eight-wicket victory over four-time defending champions Guyana Jaguars in the recent eighth-round contest at Sabina Park. He has taken 23 wickets in four matches at an average of 10.96 and strike rate of 24.3.

Regarded as one of the most skilful bowlers in modern cricket, Taylor constantly provides guidance to his teammates, and only recently was spotted giving tips to the 27-year-old Jaguars pace bowler Keon Joseph at the end of the match at Sabina Park.

Taylor, getting the ball to move both ways and generating deceptive pace from a relatively short delivery run-up, was a handful for the Jaguars' batsman, albeit on a surface that favoured bowlers.

His performance caught the attention of watchers, including Joseph, who was performing 12th-man duties for the vis-

Man Utd eyeing stunning £120m transfer for Juventus star Dybala if Lukaku goes in summer

Manchester United are eyeing a stunning swoop for Juventus star Paulo Dybala this summer if Romelu Lukaku leaves.

The Argentine superstar has impressed Old Trafford scouts over the past couple of seasons.

The 25-year-old has been earmarked by the United hierarchy as the man to take Old Gunnar Solskjaer's men to the next step and challenge for the Premier League title.

It is understood the club have already enquired about how much it would cost to land Dybala when the summer transfer window opens.

Juventus are reluctant to lose a prized asset who has helped steer them towards what looks to be another Serie A title.

But is it thought the Old Lady would be willing to sell if the right offer came in at around the \$130 million mark. Juventus have also shown as interest in Lukaku, and rumours of a potential cash plus player deal have been mentioned.

The Belgium striker would prefer to move to Juventus if he was forced out of Manchester United this summer.

He is thought to be a huge fan of Cristiano Ronaldo and wants to play with the Portuguese superstar before he retires.

Lukaku has been in fine form of late, netting a second-half double in Saturday's dramatic 3-2 win over Southampton

But Old Trafford insiders have indicated the club feel he is not the man to take them to the next level in the Champions League.

The 25-year-old, who would cost around the \$80m United paid Everton for him, is also wanted by Inter Milan.


