FDA gives approval for kids

At a meeting last week of the U.S. Food & Drug Administration's (FDA) Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee, unanimous agreement was given to recommend the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine to be given to children in America aged five to 11, having already approved the vaccine for children aged 12 and over.

The FDA panel had to approve the question as to whether the benefits of the Pfizer vaccine outweighed the risks for children aged 5 to 11, with all panellists voting for the decision to allow the vaccine to be given to younger children and one abstaining. The decision was discussed via a 7-hour-long live YouTube broadcast, which eventually saw support in favour of the vaccine being given to children.

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Check debit and credit statements carefully

Covid has meant more of us are conducting business online, but with this, the police are seeing an increase in fraudulent activity being reported, so the RCIPS Financial Crime Investigation Unit is advising the public to play close attention to their credit and debit card statements. Anyone who notices suspicious or

unauthorised transactions is advised to inform their bank immediately and contact the RCIPS Financial Crime Investigation Unit at RCIPS.FCU@rcips.ky.

Identifying and reporting suspicious or unauthorised transactions in a timely manner allows you to prevent further transactions from occurring, the funds from which may be difficult to recover.

In some cases, people have only become aware of a series of unauthorised transactions months after they first began. In cases like this, even if the individual transactions are for relatively small amounts, the cost can quickly add up.



The FCIU is also reminding the public to exercise caution when conducting credit card transactions. When paying for purchases, avoid allowing persons to walk out of sight with your credit card, especially for extended periods. People should also be extremely cautious about giving credit card information over the phone.

If you have any reason to be suspicious, monitor your credit and debit card transactions carefully, and immediately report any unauthorised purchases to your bank and to the RCIPS FCIU at the email address above.

Man arrested in relation to Martin Drive shooting

A man, aged 29 of West Bay, has been arrested on suspicion of two counts of murder, along with possession of an unlicenced firearm. The

arrest is in relation to the shooting which took place on Martin Drive on 1 July. He remains in custody as investigations continue.

Thefts from cars on the increase

The RCIPS has issued a warning not to leave valuables in cars, as there has been a spate of thefts and attempted thefts from vehicles that have taken place in the Smith Road and Windsor Park areas over the past few weeks. The police are therefore reminding the public not to leave items like shopping bags, handbags, electronics, money or jewellery where they are visible in a vehicle.

They also warn people not to leave valuables overnight or for extended periods in their cars and suggest people park vehicles in well-lit areas and, if possible, in places with security cameras or security officers on sight. People are urged to lock their cars and to ensure that all doors and windows are properly closed whenever they leave their vehicle. People should not leave vehicles running or leave vehicles with the keys inside unattended, even for a short amount of time.

The RCIPS is investigating these incidents and is encouraging all members of the public to report any such incidents to the police, regardless of whether or not anything was stolen, by calling the George Town Police Station at 949-4222, or your nearest police station.

RCIPS issues advisory on tech support scams

Police have received reports of an increasing number of 'tech support' scams across the Island, which involve scammers making contact and using scare tactics to trick people into paying for unnecessary technical support services to 'fix' a non-existent problem with an individual's device or software. The goal of such scams is to steal personal or financial information.

There are two main ways these scams are conducted. Knowing what these are will help people know the best way to respond:

The scam may be carried out using urgent pop-ups warning people that their computer has a serious problem, telling them not to turn it off, and giving a phone number to call. Real error messages from Microsoft or other tech companies do not include phone numbers to call for support. The police urge people NOT to call the number or click any links. Instead, they should restart their device immediately.

The scam may involve unsolicited phone calls or messages warning people they've spotted a critical problem with their computer or account that they need to fix. Police say NOT to click any links or call any numbers in the message and not to give the caller remote access to a computer or any personal information like passwords or account numbers. Instead, they say people should delete the suspicious messages. If it's a call, hang up.

Quarantines slows garbage collection

The Department of Environmental Health is seeking the public's patience and understanding as residential garbage collection services experiences may be delay in some areas due to a small number of staff members having to go into quarantine.

Richard Simms, DEH Director explained that the current rise of Covid-19 cases in the Cayman Islands is starting to impact the Department's garbage collection schedules, as some members of staff have been mandated to isolate. "We are seeing a trickle effect with DEH persons having to quarantine. However, we are committed to give continuation to our weekly routine. We will always seek to make our collections on time, but we recognise that some routes may be delayed by a day or so," he said.

Meanwhile, Michael Haworth, Assistant Director Solid Waste, reiterated the DEH pledge to ensure the health and safety of all its employees and the members of the public they serve.

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'Shock to the system' - Covid now 'widespread' in Cayman

The current wave of Covid-19 community cases continues its rampage through the Cayman Islands in what the Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee has now described as "widespread" and the Minister of Health and Wellness, Sabrina Turner, has termed "a shock to the system".

Between Monday and Thursday alone this past week, 447 additional community-spread cases were recorded with numbers increasing daily from 81 on Monday, to 90 on Tuesday, and 123 on Wednesday. By the time the update was released late on Thursday for tests in the previous 24 hours the number of positive results had jumped to 153.

Case rates for Friday were likely to be higher and further concerns about potential super-spreader' events from weekend Halloween festivities were also likely to trigger a further surge.

With the government ruling out any further postponement of its plan to reopen the borders on 20 November - previously delayed from 14 October due then to the emergence of community cases - increasing calls are being made for details of the reopening plan and measures to mitigate the impact of the current surge in cases beyond the current guidance on mask-wearing.

Cayman's high vaccination rate - one of the highest globally - is highlighted by government and health officials as a buffer along with the current low number of hospitalisations from the disease and the introduction of lateral flow tests.

However, significant areas of concern remain, among them the large number of

people required to isolate. The latest available figures up to 26 October was 1,458. That number would have increased since then.

The PACT government has set aside an 'isolation stipend fund' of CI\$1 million which has been estimated to equal the tourism stipend of CI\$1,500 (which is expected to be halted once the borders reopen).

In the event that the current surge continues and necessitates more isolations especially among the working population, the cost to the government in paying additional stipends, and the costs to the private sector from lost staff and business turnover could be severe, adding to an already stressed economic climate.

The implications for the business community with workers having to isolate for up to 14 days if someone in their workplace or household becomes infected is also known to be occupying the attention of business owners, with some now calling for clear and enforceable policies on public movements to safeguard the reopening plan.

The government has ruled out a lock-

down and, in an address late Friday evening aimed at reassuring the community in the face of the surge in the community cases, Hon. Premier Wayne Panton had quashed such rumours and insisted that his administration would not ever from its new reopening target of 20 November.

He called on residents to be responsible and follow the guidelines to prevent further spreading of the virus in the community.



The guidelines at present are heavily focused on mask-wearing with the public being required to "exercise good judgement" for their own safety and that of the wider community in other circumstances.

> The Delta variant is said to be the dominant feature of the virus in Cayman but the emergence of the even more infectious DeltaPlus variant is now becoming a cause of worry for governments around the world.

Many countries, including the UK, are now experiencing another spike in cases with several already putting in place or considering mitigating measures.

'The Panel' calls for clear strategies

Prior to the latest developments, this past Wednesday's edition of the *Caymanian Times* programme, The Panel, highlighted several of the issues now coming to the fore.

Stating that the intention was not 'destructive constructive criticism', host Ralph Lewis (*Caymanian Times* publisher) and panellists Roy Bodden and Mario E Ebanks, drew attention to the importance of clear measures and information



to suppress the further spread of the disease so as not to jeopardise the reopening plans.

Describing the current crisis as a "war on Covid" that should not descend into a

local turf war, it was suggested that a level of response equal to that of a hurricane activating hazard management was now required.

The ability of the health system to cope with the increased demand for tests and results as well as the availability of beds should hospitalisations increase were among the issues addressed.

The official line has been that there is currently enough spare capacity to cope, once hospitalisations remain at the current low level. However, it is feared that any worsening of the situation - from serious illnesses to staff themselves possibly having to isolate - could put the healthcare system under severe pressure.

The call was repeated on The Panel for an individual or agency to be charged with coordinating the reopening plan with clear measures, practical restrictions to curb the escalating spread, and a workable communication strategy.

With Cayman looking to rekindling stay-over tourism industry, it was felt that should visitors contact the disease while in Cayman due to lax measures, the fallout from that could seriously damage the recovery effort.

"We know that this group has experienced a lot of issues related to having to spend more time than they used to at home with little company. It has also caused many of them who had once been uninterested in social media to embrace it as a way to keep in touch with family, while pursuing their interests with like-minded people across the world," she said.

For Ms Sonia Spence attending the workshops has opened up a whole world of possibilities. "The sessions are run by friendly people who have really boosted my confidence to try out social media. I've still a long way to go but they've taught me so much," she explained.

Cayman has a seat at COP26

Premier and Minister for Sustainability and Climate Resiliency Wayne Panton is in Glasgow, Scotland, participating in COP26, where global leaders are meeting to discuss strategies to confront climate change.

The Premier joined the United Kingdom delegation and can access the Blue Zone, the United Nations-managed space that hosts the negotiations and brings together delegations from 197 parties. Access to the Blue Zone is restricted primarily to government ministers and accredited government officials. The Zone is the venue for the World Leaders' Summit on 1 and 2 November.

Premier Panton has also been invited to attend the Commonwealth Reception at the World Leaders' Summit on 2 November, an event jointly hosted by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and the United Kingdom Prime Minister the Rt. Hon. Boris Johnson, MP.

The Premier said Cayman's presence will give Cayman an opportunity to strengthen its relationships with global partners in the collective fight against climate change and the damage it is doing to planet Earth.

"The impact of climate change is frightening, especially for small islands states like ours. Our voices need to be heard loud and clear and I intend to add mine to those of our regional colleagues who share the same vulnerabilities and concerns," he said. "The Caribbean is highly vulnerable to sea level rise and increase in water temperature. Our rallying cry remains "1.5 to stay alive", the goal is to limit global temperature rise to 1.5 °C above pre-industrial levels to prevent the worst of the climate change impacts to the Caribbean, including ensuring coral reef and biodiversity survival. I join with the regional community to strongly advocate

closing the emissions gap, and increasing financial support for those nations most vulnerable to climate change impacts."

Eighteen-year-old Caymanian Dejea Lyons will also be participating in COP26. Dejea was selected as a student representative for all the UK Overseas Territories UKOT and will be speaking on an 'Oceans Panel' on Nature Day at the global conference. The Ministry for Sustainability and Climate Resiliency (SCR) are currently working with her as she prepares for her upcoming participation.

Dr. Tasha Ebanks-Garcia from the Cayman Islands' Government office in London, serves as the official contact to COP26 and initially reached out to the National Trust of the Cayman Islands for their guidance and selection of youth ambassadors. Dejea Lyons and Isabella Watler were awarded the opportunity to attend the conference. Dejea was subsequently chosen to participate as a panellist.

Annick Jackman, Director of the National Trust called Dejea an "inspiration" and called her selection "momentous".

Dejea is currently on an academic scholarship from the Ministry of Education, pursuing studies in Global Development and Sustainability at Bath Spa University in the UK and has an extensive track record of academic and extracurricular accomplishments, serving as Vice President of 'Protect Our Future' while at school at Cayman International School, when she honed her passion for the environment, championing various community initiatives.

"Since discovering my passion for the environment, I have been actively researching climate change and the impact that it will have on small island nations such as ours," Dejea stated. "Sadly howev-

er, once I became aware of these effects, I quickly came to realise that hypotheses made by scientists have started to become a reality for our islands. This includes beach erosion, coral bleaching, stronger hurricanes and more."

She said that witnessing such events fuelled her passion to help strengthen Cayman's resilience against climate change.

At COP26 she said she would be able to inform others on what the Cayman Is-

lands had been doing to alleviate the impacts of climate change on its community and would also be able to listen and learn from experts and political leaders globally about their methods of resolving this global issue.

The panel will take place on Saturday, 6 November at 11:00-11:45AM (GMT +1). The Cayman Islands Government will update the public about the availability of a live stream link access in due course.

Flu clinic open longer

The Flu Clinic located at the Cayman Islands Hospital complex has expanded its opening hours providing greater convenience and a dedicated area for the treatment of persons with flu-like symptoms. The new hours are Monday to Friday 8AM-11PM.

The dedicated Flu Clinic helps to isolate persons with flu like symptoms from the general patient population and potentially reduce opportunities for influenza/COVID transmission.

"We find that extending the hours reduces the congestion in our Accident & Emergency Unit for non-emergent cases and allows the team to appropriately triage and treat true medical emergencies," stated Deputy Chief Executive Officer Ronnie Dunn.

"Although influenza activity last year was minimal largely due to COVID-19 prevention measures such as mask wearing, predictions on what this year's flu season will look like have varied," said Medical Officer of Health, Dr Samuel Williams-Rodriguez. "This dedicated facility will allow us to better manage patient flow and an increase in cases due to COVID 19."



Dr Williams assures the public that adherence to prevention Clinic by parking in the Seventh measures such as social distancing, wearing of masks and the calling of the Flu Hotline prior to going to the clinic will help to reduce the risk of exposure to COVID-19 for patients who visit the clinic.

The Public Health Department is currently awaiting their annual supply of flu vaccines. They anticipate the arrival of vaccines before the launch of the of their flu shot campaign which is expected to run from November 2021 - March 2022.

Persons can access the Flu Day Adventist Church Parking Lot with easy access to the clinic left of the Accident & Emergency (A&E) entrance. Signage on campus will direct patients to the clinic.

All persons with flu symptoms are advised to first contact the 24hour Flu Hotline to speak to a health professional about their symptoms prior to visiting the clinic. Contact 1-800-534-8600, 345-947-3077 or flu@hsa.ky.

UK Accepts HSA's Digital Covid-19 Record

As of Monday 1 November, the UK will accept Cayman's digital vaccine certificates through the HSA Patient Portal. This removes the need for individuals travelling to the UK to request vaccination certification letters from Public Health. Those who have signed up for the HSA Patient Portal will



be able to print out their Covid-19 Vaccination Record to use as proof of their vaccination status.

Anyone who received their Covid-19 vaccine in Cayman is encouraged to sign up for the MyHSA Patient Portal. The portal is the main platform for quick access to your digital Covid-19 vaccine record.

Governor Martyn Roper said he was very pleased that Cayman's own vaccine certification is now been accepted as proof of vaccine status by UK Authorities.

"This removes a significant burden from HSA staff at this time when they are under such pressure dealing with our cases of community transmission. It also makes going to the UK an easier process for everyone travelling from Cayman," he said.

On Thursday 28 November they celebrated with an open house, so that those who are thinking about a career in the beauty and spa therapy industry could drop in and chat to the lecturers or current students about what the school can offer them.

Ashley Bodden was just coming out of the school's entrance at the Smith Road Plaza. "I think this beauty school that's just opened up seems really innovative, and something that Cayman needs, especially for those who want to venture on their creative side," she said. "I am interested in facials, manicure, pedicure and I was asking them if they were going to be exploring more in the area of doing nail art, and nail extension and acrylics, because I am very interested in that field. From what I understand CIDESCO is the highest calibre of qualification you can get, and it's very exciting that you don't have to travel off the Island to get it. CIDESCO certification is almost like a passport to the rest of your career."

Burns Wood, who comes from both Bodden Town and Honduras, has been doing a massage course as part of the beauty therapy course, although he has already worked in the industry for 18 years. It is his calling, and he plans to go into business on his own after he gets his certificate in medical massage. "In the whole of the Caribbean that can only be done here at the Cayman Career Academy," he said.

Like many of the other CCA students, Narin Suetrong, originally from Thailand, already has considerable experience in working in the Spa industry, and is doing the CIDESCO Full Beauty Therapy Certificate. Cayman in line for game changer Covid drugs

The Cayman Islands, as an Overseas Territory of the UK, is currently being considered for inclusion by the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office when it comes to the distribution of what has been termed "game changer" anti-viral drugs to help people fight Covid-19. These drugs are a simple pill that can be taken for five days at home, and which have been found to significantly reduce the chance of becoming sick should someone be exposed to Covid.

In an interview with *Caymanian Times* Publisher, Ralph Lewis, Cayman's Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee spoke about the current drugs available in Cayman to people suffering from Covid and also these new drugs that were just around the corner for people in Cayman. Drugs available if people got sick included Remdesivir and readily available steroids, while monoclonal antibodies were on order and should be arriving soon, Dr Lee said. However, Dr Lee said he was particularly excited about the emergence of antiviral tablets deployed in primary care that could be taken by people if they have had a known exposure and which would greatly reduce their chance of getting sick. The drugs were currently in the trial phases but their manufacturers were reporting they were effective, he said.

"The Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office is considering its Overseas Territories in its advance purchase just like it did an advanced purchase for the vaccines. It's considering us in the advanced purchase for this category of drug, which will be enormously helpful in keeping people out of the hospitals, so that is an exciting thing that we should hear more about by, I should think, Christmas," Dr Lee confirmed.

According to an article in the UK's *Guardian* newspaper, such an antiviral drug to treat coronavirus could be available within months in the UK after it was found to cut hospitalisations and deaths by half.

If approved, the antiviral drug would be the first

simple pill shown to be effective against Covid-19 and would mark a major advance in the fight against the pandemic, the *Guardian* wrote. The latest drug, made by Merck, known as MSD outside the US, and Ridgeback Biotherapeutics, would be

the first that could be taken by at-risk patients at home. Merck said it would apply for emergency use authorisation for the drug in the US within the next two weeks and seek the green light for use in several other countries.

Working through the Covid outbreak

An interview with Dr John Lee

Talking to the Caymanian Times Publisher, Ralph Lewis, Cayman's Chief Medical Officer Dr John Lee gave some sage advice that people could follow during this current outbreak of Covid-19, which appears to be sweeping all three islands with rapid speed.

Dr Lee said he believed the current outbreak would continue to climb for a while but said he remained "relatively reassured" that the numbers of people in hospital were not high and were not needing that much support in terms of breathing.

"We must continue to go on and enjoy our lives and do the things we like to do with people that we love"

"But the vaccination clinics are still open and, I have to say to people time and time again, you know we've seen in other countries, in all of the Overseas Territories and our partner countries, that patients who end up in intensive care and the people who unfortunately die are those who are not vaccinated, so please do come forward and get your vaccination if you can and your booster dose if you are over 50," he stated.

Dr Lee said the Government had been working incredibly hard to prepare for this outbreak and things had "ramped up a good deal since September 8th". They had been meeting every day to undertake a mini operations committee chaired by the Deputy Governor, he advised.

"It is a concern when you have an infectious disease running throughout the community, but it is good that we had high vaccination rates particularly with the most vulnerable," he confirmed, adding that by far the most vulnerable are by age.

"Age 40 and above is where the serious illness and deaths start to climb and our vaccination rates in those groups are exceedingly high, yet we know that vaccines are not 100% effective, so the higher the vaccination rate the better. Having your booster is a good thing and that will serve to protect us," Dr Lee said.

The Delta variant was so infectious and Cayman was now unable to stop it as it was out in the community. Cayman was also at a disadvantage because the country had so little community protection, unlike other countries.

"I know it's a frightening thought for us at the minute because we have had such a calm period before this storm, but we will cycle through it. We must continue to go on and enjoy our lives and do the things we like to do with people that we love," he advised. "But many will not need to seek advice because they will know the symptoms. It's just another virus," he said.

Benefits of lateral flows

Lateral flow tests should be used whenever needed, for example when visiting an elderly relative or taking part in a large group activity, to ensure everyone was Covid-free. Institutions on island such as the prison, hospice, schools and also the private sector have or will soon be instilling policies where they will test twice a week while Cayman has high community spread. This would allow the country to continue to function, because if a child registered as positive via a lateral flow but the vaccinated parent registered negative, the parent would still be able to work, he advised, provided the parent agreed to daily lateral flows. In this way the workforce wouldn't be "decimated" he said.

Dr Lee hoped that businesses would provide employees with lateral flows. Government was supplying it for civil servants. It made sense for business continuity if employers ensured that their entire workforce was not impacted by one positive result.

Positive lateral flow tests would need to be logged on a website which would send an automatic message advising Public Health. The positive person would then need to isolate for 10 days if vaccinated and 14 if not vaccinated.

When the borders open on 20 November, Dr Lee said arriving people would still need to take a PCR test within 72 hours of travel to keep the borders secure from variants, and they would still be tested, even though they did not need to quarantine.

"They will need to do a lateral flow on days 2, 6 and 10," he confirmed.

FDA gives green light to Pfizer for kids

The next step is for America's Centers for Disease Control and prevention (CDC) to give approval, which is expected on 2nd November, which could then kickstart vaccines in America for this young age group on Wednesday 3rd November.

If given the go-ahead by the CDC, children aged 5 to 11 will be give one third of the dose that adults have been receiving over two doses three weeks apart. Pfizer reported that this has been 90.7% effective in preventing symptomatic sickness.

The FDA regulators had to decide if the risks of a very rare side effect from the Pfizer vaccine (heart inflammation) were significant enough to stop the approval, but they decided it was so rare that the benefits of preventing children from getting seriously ill from Covid-19 far outweighed the risk of this rare side effect.

In America, 160 children aged five to 11 have died of Covid-19 and the country has one of the highest numbers of death anywhere in the world at about 740,000 deaths from the virus.

The UK has only just started to give 12to 15-year-olds the vaccine, given in just one dose, and, as an Overseas Territory of the UK, the Cayman Islands will have to wait until the UK gives its own approval for children aged 5 to 11 before Cayman children can receive the vaccine.

On Monday last week, Moderna announced positive results from its tests on giving its vaccine to children aged 6 to 11 and said it showed "a robust neutralising antibody response after two doses of mRNA-1273 at the $50-\mu g$ dose level with a favourable safety profile."

Moderna plans to submit this data to the FDA, the European Medicines Agency and other global regulators "in the near term".

At a recent press conference, the Chief Medical Officer, Dr John Lee, said the move to vaccinate younger children was good news and it meant a lot of people would be very pleased as they could keep their children safe, as a result, however the decision as to whether children aged 5 to 11 would be vaccinated would be in the hands of the parents and their children.

Cayman assists with regional tourism audit

People working in a management capacity within Cayman's tourism industry are being asked to complete a survey for the Caribbean Tourism Organisation (CTO) which will help the Cayman Islands Department of Tourism see how it needs to develop Cayman's tourism workforce.

The Regional Human Resources Development Knowledge and Skills Audit for the Tourism Industry has been commissioned by the CTO, with funding from the Caribbean Development Bank and CTO member countries and administered by A-Z Information Jamaica Limited (A-Z). Data gathered from the audit, which is being held Caribbean-wide, will allow the DOT to make informed decisions in its mission to develop a highly skilled tourism workforce, they said.

Tourism and Transport Minister Kenneth Bryan said that a primary focus for his Ministry was to ensure that Cavman's workforce had the necessary skills for the industry.

"By working with the CTO for this audit, we will gain valuable data to identify gaps and further invest in our people. I encourage all relevant members of the industry to take the time to complete these surveys as your participation will assist the government in improving our tourism product," he said.

The audit takes the form of a series of surveys targeted at different areas of the industry. The first survey is the General Establishment Survey that forms the primary data collection portion of the project. This survey should be completed by owners, CEOs, managing directors, general managers, or HR managers in the tourism industry including those who are self-employed. This first survey is available until Monday. 1st November 2021.

The DOT is helping to facilitate this project by providing information to A-Z who will distribute the surveys directly to relevant members of the industry. Additionally, anybody interested who are in a Audit should help tourism get back on its feet

management level as outlined can complete the survey by visiting the DOT website. Over the course of the next four weeks, other surveys will become available for completion, the DOT stated.

DOT Director Rosa Harris said that they were dedicated to supporting Cayman's tourism workforce and collaborating with regional partners to investigate opportunities for people through research. The information would be used to further inform the Department's decisions as it continued to develop national tourism

training opportunities, she advised.

Tourism Ministry and DOT sponsor hospitality courses

Two new courses are being launched by the Ministry of Tourism and Department of Tourism to provide industry-specific training for Caymanians. The Shaker International Bartenders and American Hotel and Lodging Educational Institute and the Wine and Spirits Education Trust Front of House courses are taught by Wineschool3 and are aimed at elevating the Cayman Islands tourism experience.

As part of the DOT National **Tourism Training Programme**, 41 Caymanians will be offered the exclusive opportunity to attend these courses in partnership with Wineschool3. These accredited courses will be free of charge and offered to qualifying Caymanians who either wish to launch a career or develop their skills in the drinks and hospitality industry.

The Shaker International Bartenders course includes practical skills and the theoretical knowledge required for professional bartending either in bars, restaurants and hotels. The syllabus includes five modules which covers the mechanics of bartending, customer service, beer, wine and champagne service and cocktail mixology.

Participants, who will be provided with bar tending kits to complete the course, must be over the legal age for drinking alcohol (18 years old) and meet the qualifying criteria to be considered. Students will be required to attend at least 80% of the sessions and pass the WSET exams to obtain international certificates, which is a recognised qualification in the Cayman Islands.

The bartending training will be open to 16 Caymanians (proof of citizenship required) and will begin on 8 November for 12 days, running from Monday to Saturday 9am to 5pm (off Sunday).

The Front of House training course focuses on training students to offer an outstanding dining experience with the highest level of professionalism. The course is designed to facilitate 'work ready' hospitality employees who can build a career in the service industry while enhancing Cayman's Tourism product.

The syllabus includes a variety of topics to ensure that individuals possess a broad scope of skills needed for the fastpaced hospitality industry. This includes meeting and greeting guests, restaurant server training, service sequence, kitchen safety guidelines, sanitation regulations, up-selling and more.

The Front of House Server Training will be open for 25 Caymanians (proof of citizenship required) and will run for five consecutive days from 22 November, 9am to 5pm.

Opposition get their boosters

Leader of the Opposition, Roy McTaggart rolled up his sleeve for his vaccination booster shot at the Lions Centre on Thursday 28 October. The H.S.A has made the booster shots available, free of charge, to anyone who is over the age of 50, or considered vulnerable due to some other medical reason. There should be a 6-month gap between the second vaccination (leading to 'fully vaccinated status,') and the booster shot.

"I think it's important that everyone becomes fully vaccinated as quickly as we can do so. Vaccinations are the only real way we can protect the country and protect our people from the debilitating effects of the virus, and I think it just behooves everyone to take their vaccinations and make sure they're protected," Mr. McTaggart said. "One of the things I am doing here this morning and I hope people will appreciate is we are leading by example, in coming together here in order to show Cayman that we are not only pro-vaccine, and pro-booster-shots, but taking it ourselves."

George Town MPs Barbara Conolly, David Wight, and Alden McLaughlin were there too, filling in the forms on the cards which are issued to everyone who takes the booster jab. Whatever differences the Government and the Opposition might have, they are all singing off the same page when it comes to being pro-vaccination as the only real way forward for the country. "I'm here today to take my booster jab,"

said Ms. Conolly, "The importance of the

booster is to protect us, and to keep us safe, and I would encourage more and more of my constituents as well as the people of the Cayman Islands as a whole to come out and take the booster. At the end of the day it's to keep us all safe, and to keep this virus from spreading."

Mr. Wight had a good, real-life example to tell about the vaccine's effectiveness: "My brother and his wife went to visit her family in Virginia, and he was there, with them in the same house for a week. The grandparents started to feel ill, and they went and took a Covid test, and it turned out that they had Covid. But my brother had no symptoms, because he had taken the vaccination, but all the others who were feeling ill hadn't had the vaccination."

Opposition Leader Mr. McTaggart said he hadn't got a problem with the Government's plans to open up the country on 20 November, saying: "We have told the Government and told the country that we have to reopen, but we have to do so in as safe a manner as possible. And the safest way to do that is to make sure people are vaccinated. I think it's important that all the services that we rely on, whether its

education, health, or other services such as police, everybody is ready for us to reopen," he added.

Booster programme continues for persons 50 and over

The Covid-19 vaccination clinic will continue to administer booster shots to persons age 50 and over, the clinically vulnerable and healthcare workers. The third dose of the Pfizer BioNTech vaccine must be administered at least six months after the second dose. Persons eligible to receive their booster should bring along their vaccination card or digital certificate showing proof of their second dose and a government issued photo ID.

Doses 1 and 2 are still available to persons age 12 and over at any Covid-19 vaccine clinic.

For the safety of staff and patients, persons who are experiencing flu-like symptoms are asked to wait until they are feeling well to be vaccinated.

If you are home bound and unable to attend one of the vaccination clinics, please contact the Flu Hotline 947-3077, 1-800-534-8600, flu@hsa.ky or your local HSA District Health Centre and arrangements will be made with a Public Health nurse to provide your vaccine in the comfort of your home.



Jamaica scoops region's awards again

Jamaica continued its dominance at the annual World Travel Awards, taking the Caribbean's Leading Destination and Caribbean's Leading Cruise Destination trophies at this year's staging in Dubai, United Arab Emirates.

Jamaica also won the Caribbean's Leading Adventure Tourism Destination and Caribbean's Leading Nature Destination categories.

Dunn's River Falls won Caribbean's Leading Adventure Tourist Attraction; Eclipse at Half Moon received the Caribbean's Leading New Hotel; Sandals Resorts International was again voted Caribbean's Leading Hotel Brand, with winners among its Jamaican portfolio including Sandals South Coast taking the Caribbean's Leading Hon-

Tourism Minister Edmund Bartlett said: "Jamaica is truly honoured to be recognised in this way by the esteemed World Travel Awards group. Indeed, these accolades are a testament to the confidence the global travel industry has in Jamaica and all we have to offer."

European volcano dust affects Grenada

Parts of Grenada are being affected by volcanic ash from the Cumbre Vieja volcano in the Canary Islands, 5,000 miles away in Europe. It began erupting on 19 September.

The Meteorological Office at the Maurice Bishop International Airport confirmed that the hazy conditions that the island has been experiencing for the past few days are due to a combination of Saharan dust and volcanic ash.

The National Disaster Management Agency (NaDMA) encouraged motorists and marine users to be cautious because of reduced visibility.

The Ministry of Health advised people with respiratory challenges such as asthma and other allergies "to wear a mask, avoid outdoor contact, if possible, ensure you have an adequate supply of medication and to be in contact with your medical physician, in the event such intervention is needed".

Scientists said that initially, the plumes of sulphur dioxide from the volcano travelled east from the Canary Islands to northern Africa and southern Europe. However, because of a change in wind direction in early October, the plume is now flowing across the Atlantic and over the Caribbean.

Grenada was also affected by ash plumes from the La Soufriere volcano in St Vincent and the Grenadines when it erupted in December 2020.

Mottley: give Barbados climate change help

Barbados is battling climate change and feels it is on the "front line," said Prime Minister Mia Mottley. Like many Caribbean islands, Barbados is threatened by rising sea levels and extreme weather events like hurricanes that are increasing in intensity and frequency.

Emerging countries like Barbados need financial assistance to adapt to and mitigate against climate change, Mottley insisted.

Twelve years ago, developed nations pledged \$100 billion a year towards helping them do it by 2020, but that target was not met. Mottley is among world leaders at the climate change conference (COP26) in Scotland arguing that sufficient measures are not being made. It's not just a question of countries sharing responsibilities, she said, but of ensuring their very existence. "This issue is about life and death for us. It is an issue about the stability of a nation."

Mottley has made tackling the country's spiralling debt a priority, and she negotiated a debt restructuring for Barbados shortly after taking office in 2018 that included "natural-¬disaster clauses" to allow a break in interest repayments in the aftermath of extreme weather events. But the combined impact of those disasters and the Covid-19 pandemic has taken a heavy toll economically on the island. "You are effectively talking about the potential loss of a decade," Mottley said.

Trinidad-JA popular flights resume

The Trinidad-based Caribbean Airlines will soon resume direct flights to Jamaica following the lifting of the travel restrictions that had been imposed between the two islands because of the coronavirus pandemic.

CAL said that the service will resume from 1 December and that the flights are timed to facilitate same-day onward connections to Nassau, Bahamas and other destinations.

According to CAL, the flights will operate on Wednesday and Friday mornings, with return flights from Kingston to Port of Spain on Wednesday and Friday evenings.

The airline also announced that flights from Kingston to Nassau will be on Wednesday mornings and the return that evening.

CAL also announced that its services between Port of Spain and Jamaica to Saint Maarten will resume on 11 December.

The airline urged passengers to use its website to verify entry requirements and other important travel information for any destination, as well as make appointments for Covid-19 tests.

Dominican pupils get more digital

Dominica's Ministry of Education has started the distribution of electronic devices to school pupils island wide.

This is a direct response to the challenges faced this school year, as a spike in Covid-19 cases meant more online lessons. This decision was taken in a bid to keep staff and students safe without a major disruption in the academic year.

During the distribution of devices in the Grand Bay Constituency, Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit encouraged pupils to make the most of this opportunity for their education.

So far 55 students at the Tete Morne Primary, 122 at the Grand Bay Primary, 80 students at the Roseau Primary, 180 from the Goodwill Primary and 167 from the Atkinson, Salybia, Sineku and Concord Primary schools have received their new devices.


