New complicated procedure for quarantine release

Public Health have this week released new procedures for people in quarantine looking to be released, an exit system that is based upon the CT values of a person's PCR result.

CT stands for 'cycle threshold', a value that is revealed during PCR testing for Covid, often referred to as the 'gold standard' for testing. During the PCR testing process, the material taken from the individual goes through multiple cycles until a detectable

amount of the virus is found. If a higher number of cycles is required before the virus is detected, that means the individual most likely has a lower viral load than people with a lower CT number, whose viral infection has been spotted with fewer cycles of detection, implying they have a higher viral load.

With regard to quarantine exit tests, where a person has a CT value of 32 or more, and has completed their isolation period and has had no symptoms for at least 24 hours, they can submit an early release request form to Public Health. The form requires the individual to upload their PCR test result. If Public Health is satisfied that the criteria are met, the individual will receive an exit confirmation email and then the individual can leave isolation. Public Health also said that when they state a person should not have had symptoms for at least 24 hours, the person may still have a dry cough, loss of smell or taste, and/or a runny nose.

If a person has **28 to 31.9** as their CT value, then they must simply call the flu hotline for further assessment, 1-800-534 8600 or 947 3077 or email flu@hsa. ky.

If a person has a CT value of 27.9 or less on their exit PCR test then they must isolate further. The guidelines for this additional isolation are as follows:

- 7 days for vaccinated people
- 10 days for unvaccinated people

· Unvaccinated children must vaccinate based upon the vaccination status of their parents



It should also be noted that an isolation exit test with a CT value of:

• 25 to 27.9 requires the individual to take a repeat PCR test 2 days after their last PCR test

• 20 to 24.9 requires a repeat PCT test 4 days after the last PCR

• 20 and under - people must contact the flu hotline for a retesting date.

In the UK, the procedure is far simpler and provides for the individual to take personal responsibility for their exit after a Covid infection. If a person tests positive, their self-isolation period includes the day their symptoms started (or the day they had the test, if they do not have symptoms) and the next 10 full days. If they get symptoms while they're self-isolating, the 10 days restarts from the day after their symptoms started. In the UK, people can do a rapid lateral flow test from day five of their self-isolation period (but not before) and another test the next day. They can stop self-isolating if both tests are negative and the individual does not have a high temperature. Tests have to be reported to the authorities and people can stop testing after they've had two negative test results in a row.

With anecdotal evidence in Cayman suggesting some people are not reporting their positive cases because they fear they will be required to isolate for overly long periods of time, this means that any data recorded by government will not be an accurate reflection of the true picture as it relates to Covid cases in the Cayman Islands.

TALK ON THE STREET Cayman Airways new aircraft

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Quality matches strengthen BBBS programme

The pandemic has impacted the lives of everyone in the Cayman Islands, and children have been especially vulnerable to the anxieties and mental strains caused by lockdowns, quarantines, and keeping safe. While always playing a vital role in the community, entities such as Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Cayman Islands (BBBS), which place a focus on the positive development of Cayman's youngsters, have therefore never had a more crucial role to play.

BBBS is a non-profit mentoring organisation that relies solely on donations to operate, and which matches trained volunteers with young people. The mentor is referred to as the 'Big' and the mentee the 'Little'. Bigs commit to mentor their young person for a year but often the relationship lasts a lot longer. Children from the age of six to 16 can be mentored, although a big focus of the organisation is the 8 to 14 age group.

In March 2021, Angela Martins took on the role of Executive Director and is responsible for the management of the match of the young person with their 'Big' (Brother or Sister) and Erin Kaufman became the Programmes Manager, overseeing the onboarding process, where matching takes place.

Upon joining BBBS, the pair undertook a review of best practices, reaching out to

international BBBS organisations and this has helped them to create best practices



that have been modified to ensure they have Cayman context.

A big focus has been to ensure longevity of the relationships.

"It's not just about making matches, it's about the sustainability of the matches," Ms Martins advised. "The international standard is a check in [with the pair] every month for the first year and then every three months after that. I'm excited and proud that Erin and I closed out 2021 with matches in a good place right now, with around 40 matches currently in place."

"What I have come to acknowledge is quality over quantity," Ms Kaufman advised. "When we both came in, we said we were going to make all these matches, yet the deeper we got into the work, we started to realise the better contribution we could make was to work on restructuring the organisation, rewrite policies and focus on getting matches of quality and ones that will be sustainable."

Ms Kaufman said she was particularly proud of the fact that their matches had all started off a on a good foot.

"To create sustainable matches and to allow them to journey together is definitely the goal," she said.

"If you talk to some of our Bigs they don't see the relationship ending just because the Little gets to 18. They see them as their person," Ms Martin said. "The formal year out of BBBS is 18 and we no longer have any governance around that relationship, but invariably the Bigs are still in touch and helping their Littles to stay on track."

Parental support of the relationship was crucial to its success.

"The lynchpin for the match is the support the parents give to the match," Ms Martins advised.

Boys come easily into the programme. Ms Martins said, because boys tended to be louder in their need for assistance; however, BBBS is eagerly inviting referrals and applications for girls to mentor because, although they tended to not show their need as vociferously as boys, there are many ways that they too can benefit.

"We do have several trained female volunteers sitting waiting to be matched with girls. Before, our call out was for male volunteers to be Bigs to boys but, while that will always be the case, right now the call is for female Littles to match with women," Ms Kaufman advised.

The pandemic has definitely made its mark on the programme and had affected all their children, Ms Martins said. The mental health impacts on Littles included children feeling the need to incessantly wash their hands and shower all the time, Littles uncomfortable going out with their Bigs believing the outside was not a safe place to be. And while there was fear in the child, there was also fear in the parents who were hesitant about letting their child out, she said. There was also the impacts of online learning and separation from their peers and lack of direct contact with the teacher, while some parents didn't have internet contact.

Ms Kaufman said that relationships between Bigs and Littles were certainly challenged during the pandemic. Relationships which were further along their journey had been easier to maintain, although where there was a lot of fear in families, the relationship had still been strained. As a result, BBBS had to work hard to maintain connections with their Bigs and Littles, and managed to do so in creative ways, achieving notable outcomes in 2021 and in 2022 so far.

CRUISE CONTROL - VARIABLE SPEED AHEAD

Getting tourism back on track remains a priority for Caribbean destinations which rely on the industry for most, or at least a considerable portion, of their national income.

While no common policy exists, many countries in the Caribbean are however generally sailing back into cruise tourism some more aggressively than others.

The contrast between numerous cruise ships docked at selected ports and others bypassing destinations that pre-COV-ID would have been definite ports of call could not be more stark.

But while some stare wistfully at the passing floating hotel and lament what they see as economic possibilities going amiss, others have a different view; lamenting what they still regard as a public health risk.

The push to reopen tourism-dependent economies is being driven to varying degrees by economic demand, destination popularity and an ever-present underlying competition among the islands.

Despite umbrella membership of the Caribbean Tourism Organisation (CTO) and the Caribbean Hotel and Tourism Association (CHTA), the unique pull-factor of individual islands and the varying dependence on cruise and stay-over tourism has meant that different islands have taken varying paths on the road to reopening.

Specific national policies and protocols especially with the pressure to recover from the devastating economic and public health impact of the COVID-19 pandemic have been the key considerations. Already in some destinations, a managed-risk approach has seen multiple cruise ships in their ports while others, including the Cayman Islands, have been more cautious; delaying the reactivation of cruise travel until mutually acceptable protocols are agreed upon between the destination and the cruise companies.

Hosting a top-level delegation from the important Florida-Caribbean Cruise Association(FCCA) which represents the cruise industry, Cayman's Hon. Minister for Tourism Kenneth Bryan remarked: "We have used every sin-

gle opportunity to talk and discuss the most important and pressing issues concerning our cruise tourism sector.

At the very top of the list are health and safety protocols, because right now due to the pandemic we have no cruise industry at all, and that's a sad day for our country. So, our immediate priority has been to discuss a way forward that will allow cruise ships to return while keeping our communities safe."

Speaking for the FCCA, the organisation longstanding president Michelle Paige, put returning to Cayman as a key objective for the cruise industry.

"The cruise industry is looking forward to renewing one of the best relationships



that we've ever had in the world with the Cayman Islands," she said.

"The Cayman Islands because of the private sector has always delivered phenomenal experience. You've always been at the highlight of every single cruise passenger's experience. So it is only fitting that the work that's being put into place to make sure that we're going to elevate the product and elevate the expenditures that the passengers and the crew spend in the Cayman Islands that this is going to be a very rewarding time."

It is not yet known if any new formal agreement has yet been finalised on the relationship between Cayman and the cruise industry going forward.

The cruise industry has suffered a debilitating blow from the COVID-19 pandemic from both a public health and an economic standpoint with massive outbreaks of the disease on many ships forcing the entire cruise industry to be metaphorically berthed for the past two years.

COMMENTARY

Recent efforts to relaunch the industry have also witnessed outbreaks of the current Omicron variant aboard several ships venturing back into cruising.

The US Centres for Disease Control (CDC) which oversees America's national health policy, which earlier this year increased the risk level for cruise ship travel to its highest level, still maintains a degree of caution.

Although its 'conditional sail order' expired mid-January, the CDC still advises on its website that cruise lines are encouraged to continue to follow all CDC public health measures, including reporting, testing, and infection prevention and control.

It said that more information about its COVID-19 Program for Cruise Ships will be released soon.

New tagging project to learn more about turtles

Cayman Turtle Conservation and Education Centre and Upwell, a non-profit dedicated to protecting turtles at sea, are working together on a project to track released turtles, in a bid to learn more about turtles' lives. It is hoped that the project will help to further efforts in order to save the endangered species.

In what is being termed an unprecedented research project, 30 juvenile Green Sea Turtles of varying ages have been released directly into the waters off Grand Cayman, wearing tiny tracking devices that will monitor their movements.

The turtles carry prototype micro-satellite tags, weighing less than a penny and safely attached to the turtles' shells using epoxy and neoprene-silicone mounts.

Sea turtles have been studied often as they hatch, and when they return to those beaches years later to breed. But the time in-between, when young turtles develop in the open sea, remains a mystery. This life-history stage is often referred to as the "lost years", and this is the time the experts want to track.


The project was developed by Dr George Shillinger, Executive Director of Upwell, and long-time Upwell collaborator Dr Helen Bailey of the University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science. Nicole Barbour, Upwell researcher and doctoral student at the Uni-

versity of Maryland, will be analysing the data as part of her graduate research. Upwell is funding the research and releasing the turtles, in partnership with CTCEC. Dr Shillinger said endangered sea turtles faced high mortality rates due to threats in the ocean, including fisheries bycatch, ship strikes, pollution, climate change and other detrimental human activities.

"This research may provide critical information that will help conservationists protect



them throughout their lives, because protecting turtles when they're on the shore simply isn't enough," he said.

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CTCEC is a critical part of the research, as the only conservation organisation that hatches turtles for release into the ocean. The turtles were raised, or "head-started," at the Centre until they were large enough to release with a favourable chance of survival. Upwell focuses on research and conservation of turtles in their at-sea environments and is pioneering new techniques to shed light on the lost years for multiple sea turtle species.

It has been estimated that from the 33 to 39 million sea turtles found in the Caribbean hundreds of years ago, numbers have now fallen to almost nothing. Historically, the Cayman Islands has been considered the most important breeding and nesting area in the Caribbean. Today, this breeding population has been reduced to roughly 100 females and the IUCN Red List lists the green turtle as being 'regionally extinct' in the Cayman Islands, Dr Walter Mustin, Chief Research and Conservation Officer at CTCEC said.

It is anticipated that the data collected will help explain more about the movements and behaviour of juvenile greens and how to better conserve and protect this ecologically critical specie. GET

Cayman's Denver visitors to fly newest jet fleet in the Caribbean

Cayman Islands visitors from the West Coast, USA, will experience flying the newest jet fleet in the Caribbean when Cayman Airways' nonstop flights from Denver, Colorado, to Grand Cayman resumes on February 26, 2022.

Carrying the dual title of also being the first Caribbean-based airline to operate the brand-new state-of-the-art Boeing 737-8 jet aircraft, Cayman Airways now offers travelers extra inflight storage space, roomier cabins, more seats in Business Class, and over 30% more seats overall than the airline's previous jet fleet.

Cayman Airways' Denver route is being offered in partnership with the Ministry of Tourism & Transport, and the Cayman Islands Department of Tourism (DOT), and will operate through August 6, 2022.

In-keeping with the Denver market's average vacation duration of seven days, the Denver flight schedule is relaunching with one flight per week, on Saturdays, between Owen Roberts International Airport (ORIA) and Denver International Airport (DEN). Flight KX440 will depart ORIA at 9am and arrive at DEN at 11:30am. On the return, flight KX441 will depart Denver at 12:50pm and arrive on Grand Cayman at 7:20pm. The schedule times change slightly between March 19, 2020 through August 6, 2022 due to the state's Daylight Savings Time changes. See schedule graph.



Ms Sharon Smith is Honoured with MBE

When His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Martyn Roper called to inform retired Deputy Clerk of Parliament, Ms Sharon Smith that she was chosen to be a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) by Her Majesty the Queen, she could not believe her ears.

"I was astonished as I did not expect to hear such news," she says.

After she got over the initial shock, her excitement grew at the once-in-a-life-time honour. It was made even sweeter by the recognition also coming for long-standing public service to the Cayman Islands community, including her beloved East End, where she was delivered by a midwife in 1954 at her uncle's home, and has resided in the district ever since.

She now has the privilege of adding MBE after her name and before her Justice of the Peace (JP) title. Yet, her innate humility and pragmatic nature still shine out.

This stalwart of the civil service retired in December 2020 after almost half a century – 47 years, 7 months to be exact – spent working for the Legislative Assembly, which she saw transition to a Parliament.

Her dedication to her work in the Legislative Assembly was legend throughout her career, notably her commitment to helping guide and inform newly-elected MLAs and later MPs.


During this time, Ms Sharon, as she is better known, was often the go-to person over the years for information regarding historical and procedural matters as well as rules. This applied equally to legislators, Speakers of the House when newly appointed, and colleagues. She is a fount of knowledge and anecdotes about every aspect of the legislature from the seventies in the previous century to the present as well as the colourful personalities who walked its corridors as peoples' representatives and Government Members.

The veteran civil servant, who turned 68 on 14 January 2022, completed high school in 1972 (one had to be seven years old to start primary school in those days). She then went on to the International College of the Cayman Islands (ICCI) to successfully complete a secretarial course.

After that, it was straight to the Legislative Assembly. She was tested by the then Clerk and later National Hero, Hon. Sybil McLaughlin and appointed to start on 1 June 1973 as a Clerical Assistant.

So, as a 19-year-old, she began her career on a starting salary of \$174, as one among only five employees in the House. The rest is history, as Ms Sharon climbed the ranks till she was named Deputy Clerk, a position in which she also served as the Acting Clerk on a number of occasions.

Over the course of her career, Ms Sharon fondly recalls many who made an impact on her life such as Mr. Willie Farrington; Cl's first National Hero, Hon. James Manoah Bodden; Capt. Keith Tibbetts; Mr. Ormond Panton; Mr. Claude Hill; Mr. Berkeley Bush; former Chief Secretaries Mr. Dennis Foster and Mr. Desmond Watler, to name a few. She also recalls the House growing from only 12 Members to now 19 MPs.

Recalling the times she represented the Cayman Islands in international conferences over the years including at Nairobi, Kenya, and regionally in St. Kitts and Turks & Caicos Islands, she says: "More or less, it was a learning experience all the way through."

Over the years, she grew into a solid authority on rules, procedures and house business matters, learning much from her superiors and in turn, teaching newcomers to the House, whatever their position might be.

Her work in the community includes assisting with teaching in the Girls Brigade, serving as the Secretary of the East End Pirates Week Committee as well as Secretary and Accounts Officer for the East End Community Development Committee, each for a number of years.

In addition to her deep community roots in the entire district and more specifically Gun Bay, Ms Sharon is also a devoted family person.

Her husband Mr. Joseph H Smith Snr. who is originally from Honduras, got status in 1989 and has lived in Cayman for over three-quarters of his life - was a carpenter and mason in the building trade, and later retired to be a cattle and produce farmer.

Their son Mr. Joseph Smith Jr. and his wife Ms Joyann have three children, who



are the pride and joy of their grandmother. Their daughter Ms Melissa N. Smith, also a civil servant, works for Education Services.

Ms Sharon's parents were also from East End. Her father, the late Mr. Vernie Dixon, used to work with the Caymanian enterprise Wholesome Bakery while her mother the late Ms Natalie Rankine nee Bodden raised the children.

Ms Sharon recalls life was not easy in those days, including when many mothers still delivered babies in their own homes, with the assistance of midwives. Her grandmother Ms Mercereta Bodden was a midwife in East End, being able to provide a number of proven, tested and tried bush medicines to her "patients", including for pain, she remembers.

All in all, Ms Sharon has embraced her new life as a retired person, and is giving thanks for her life, her family and friends and above all her beloved nation and community, with which she still engages on a daily basis.

Her one message to young Caymanians: to never be shy of hard work, dedication to duty, love and active service to the community and fellow Caymanians, young and old alike. "The Cayman Islands is a beautiful place to live and grow. Let us give thanks always and work hard to preserve the good qualities that make us unique," she emphasises.

Curbside Access for Passenger Drop-offs and Pick-ups at Grand Cayman Airport Reinstated

The Cayman Islands Airports Authority (CIAA), which operates the Owen Roberts International Airport (ORIA) on Grand Cayman and the Charles Kirkconnell International Airport (CKIA) on Cayman Brac, announced today that drivers approaching ORIA will be permitted curbside access for the purpose of dropping off or picking up passengers only, starting 14 February 2022. However, for the safety of all Airport customers, vehicles entering the approach road to the ORIA terminal will be subject to security screening at the Airport Security Checkpoint Booth prior to curbside access being granted.

In August 2021, the CIAA announced that as of 30 August only authorised public transportation and tour operators would be permitted to drop off or pick up passengers at curbside in front of the main terminal with all other vehicular traffic routed to the Short-Term or Long-Term parking lots. "We understand that these changes to vehicular traffic flows entering and exiting ORIA impacted our customers, but our goal has always been to ensure a safe and secure environment while maintaining a positive customer experience," said Chief Airport Security Officer Chad Yates. "With curbside access now being reinstated, we have implemented new screening measures, such as security screening of unvetted/public vehicles, to help protect the traveling and general public, and will remain vigilant that curbside use is conducted in a timely manner."

Commenting on the new system, Hon. Kenneth Bryan, Min-

ister for Tourism and Transport said, "I am very pleased that the CIAA has identified a cost-effective way to restore curbside access to the public, while remaining in compliance with international security requirements. Travelling is time sensitive and people need and expect a fast, efficient and convenient way to drop off or pick up travellers. This is a win-win solution that keeps safety as the top priority and delivers a better experience for the public."

Airport customers still have the option and are encouraged to use the drop-off zone in the Short-Term parking lot, located just before reaching the Airport Security Checkpoint Booth, which has been allocated for those persons dropping off departing passengers, or to park in the Short-Term parking lot to pick up arriving passengers. Parking is free for up to five minutes after which time the standard parking rates apply.





Airport customers exiting the Short-Term or Long-Term parking lots now have the added convenience of being able to pay their parking fees by credit or debit card at the exit machines. The exit machines accept Mastercard and Visa cards and are equipped with an intercom help button should customers require assistance from an Airport Ground Transportation Officer. Customers may also pay their parking fees by cash at any one of the pay stations located inside the main airport terminal.

Winners Announced for the 28th

Twelve of Cayman's cultural practitioners and preservationists will be honoured for their contribution to the country's arts and cultural legacy at the Cayman National Cultural Foundation's 28th annual National Arts and Culture Awards which takes place on Thursday, 17 February at the Harquail Theatre.

Charles Long, Donna Bryan, Margaret Barwick, Natalie Urquhart, Jawara, Ky-Mani Rudolph Davis III (posthumous), Yonier Powery Serrano, Simon Tatum, the Cayman Art Week Committee, Staff of the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands and Stoak'd (Marc & Pam Laurenson) will be recognised for their talent and expertise in the areas of fine arts, fashion design, entertainment, digital art marketing, thatch making and cultural and historic preservation. Prolific visual artist Bendel Hydes will be given the Visionary Award.

National Arts and Culture Awards are given to those who have made a significant contribution to arts and culture or achieved a high-quality body of creative work. The honourees will be presented with their awards at a formal ceremony surrounded by family and friends. In addition, presentations will be made to the sponsor of the year and the recipient of the Chairman's Award for long-term support of CNCF's work. Due to COVID gathering restrictions, the event is invitation-only.

Cultural and heritage organisations, as well as the general public, were asked to submit nominations for the CNCF Heritage Cross and Star for Creativity in the Arts. A CNCF-appointed committee ultimately chose the recipients. Nominations are open between January and September each year.

CNCF Heritage Cross

The CNCF Heritage Cross award is reserved for individuals and groups who have a consistent and active, quality engagement in the preservation and/or celebration of Caymanian cultural heritage. The award has three levels: GOLD for a lifetime of high-quality engagement; SIL-VER (minimum of 10 years) and BRONZE (minimum of 5 years).

CNCF Star for Creativity in the Arts

The CNCF Star for Creativity in the Arts is awarded for artistic endeavour, achievement and excellence in the arts. Like the Heritage Cross, the Star for Creativity also has three levels reflecting the span of the artist's work and/or its overall impact.

"We recognise now, as we do annually through our National Arts and Culture Awards, the many heroic Caymanians – old and young, sung and unsung, past and present – who built the traditions of community, patriotism, love, loyalty, industry, sharing and caring. We are as certain as anyone can be that if Cayman is to retain any semblance of the country that gives substance and meaning to these values of humanity, we must retain and hold them steadfastly as the pillars upon which our future is built." said Marcia Muttoo, CNCF Managing Director.

GOLD HERITAGE CROSS AWAR DEES

Charles Long moved to the Cayman Islands with his family in the late 1960s and began an art career spanning over half a

century. A founding member of the Visual Arts Society, Long crafted his own visual aesthetic that is quintessentially Caymanian. His paintings employ a stylistic language that represents the emergence of a distinct voice in Caymanian art, one that is vernacular and rooted in the sensory experience, landscapes and seascapes of our islands. His work has achieved iconic status and is easily recognisable for its brightly coloured palette and flattened, mural-style of depiction.



Long's work is held in the collections of the Cayman Islands National Museum and the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands, as well as numerous private collections, and has been featured in countless National Gallery exhibitions, including a career retrospective in 2002. In 2017, he received the CNCF's Star for Creativity, GOLD.

Donna Bryan grew up in Cayman Brac and from the age of 10 was taught by her mother how to plait silver thatch palm. When she came over to Grand Cayman to live, she continued with her thatching skills.



Ms. Bryan has taught thatching in all but one public school, including her visits to the John Gray High School (JGHS) during lunch times. Government funds were allocated to assist with the JGHS initiative and during one of the school's Professional Development days, Ms. Bryan came in and shared her knowledge with the teachers in the Art Department who embraced the class and decided to offer it to Key Stage 3 students as part of the curriculum during the term. Ms. Bryan has also taught thatching at a few private schools. Her thatch pieces have been showcased by Girls Brigade International, at Heritage Week (formerly known as Pirates Week) and the Kimpton Seafire Resort & Spa.

GOLD STAR FOR CREATIVITY AWARDEES

In 1977 **Margaret Barwick** arrived in the Cayman Islands from her homeland of New Zealand via the Solomon Islands, Kiribati and Malawi. She quickly became involved in the establishment of the Visual Arts Society (VAS), the islands' first formal art collective. Subsequently, she headed the first Cayman Islands contingent to CARIFESTA IV in Barbados in 1981.



Barwick has also designed national stamps, created the Tortola, BVI's J. R. O'Neal Botanic Gardens, played a leading role in the design of the Cayman Islands Queen Elizabeth II Botanic Park and wrote the authoritative *Tropical and Subtropical Trees: A Worldwide Encyclopaedic Guide* (2004).

Barwick's work has been exhibited in London, New Zealand, Malawi, Barbados, France and the Cayman Islands and can be found in the collections of the Cayman Islands National Museum and the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands.

Natalie Urquhart is the Director and Chief Curator of the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI). She has worked within the regional cultural sector for over 20 years and is a leading authority on Caymanian art and culture, and author of the islands' first formal art history.



In 2019 she established the *Cayman Islands Biennial* – the country's first multi-venue tri-island contemporary art project – and more recently launched the inaugural Cayman Art Week in response to the impact of the pandemic on the creative sector. Her own curatorial practice explores the influence of traditional cultural heritage and memory on contemporary art in the Cayman Islands, which has led to over 30 exhibition projects including 21st Century Cayman, The Persistence of Memory, Tidal Shift, REVIVE – Contemporary Caymanian Craft, Upon the Seas, and The Art of Fashion.

Urquhart is a former President of the Museums Association of the Caribbean (2017-2020) and has served on the Boards of the Tilting Axis - Caribbean Art Alliance, the Visual Arts Society, the Cayman Islands Chamber of Commerce, and the Cayman Islands Constitution Commission, among others. She is the recipient of the Young Caymanian Leadership Award, 2011, a CNCF Star for Creativity in the Arts, Silver 2009 and Heritage Cross, Silver 2015, and a Cayman Islands Literary Award, 2017. In 2022 she was recognised with a British Empire Medal in the Queens Honours List for her services to arts and culture in the Cayman Islands and the wider region.

SILVER STAR FOR CREATIVITY AWARDEES

Jawara Alleyne is a Caymanian artist and fashion designer whose work deals with questions of cultural identity from a Caribbean perspective. In 2013 he received a scholarship from the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI) and Deutsche Bank, which he used to pursue a bachelor's degree in Fashion Design and Marketing at The London College of Fashion. Following his graduation in 2016 Alleyne co-founded the diversity conscious Nii model agency in London with photographer and collaborator Campbell Addy. He also completed a master's degree in Fashion Design at Central Saint Martin's, London in 2020.



Alleyne's work was featured in the NGCI exhibition *Art of Fashion* (2018) and *Cross Currents - 1st Cayman Islands Biennial* in 2019. He is an avid representative of the Cayman Islands internationally, representing Cayman at the 2017 CARIFES-TA festival and in London at the United Kingdom Overseas Territory Association (UKOTA). In 2018, he received a CNCF Star for Creativity, BRONZE.

Ky-Mani Davis – affectionately known as Rudolph, DJ TNT, and Rudy – was born in Grand Cayman on 20th January 1975 to the late Rudolph Davis II, and Sonia Davis, who emigrated from Belize. Around 1986, he learned to mix music under the tutelage of Neil Sambula a.k.a. "DJ Neil Sam", and deejayed alongside his lifelong friend, Arek Gardner a.k.a. "DJ Atom Skillz".



An in-demand DJ, Rudolph travelled and entertained around the globe for more than 30 years. He also mentored and/or partnered with fellow Cayman-based DJs such as New Generation, Super C, Selecta

Renegade, Coalition and La Familia, and internationally acclaimed DJ crews such as Poison Dart.

Sadly, Ky-Mani passed away on 14 December 2020 at the age of 45, leaving behind a legacy of memorable accomplishments and devoted fans. He will always be remembered as a musical legend.

BRONZE STAR FOR CREATIVITY AWARDEES

Yonier Powery Serrano was born on Isle of Youth, Cuba. Beginning his artistic studies in 1999, his prolific output, which ranges from painting and drawing to intricate ceramic pieces, reflects the artist's personal biography and his twin influence of his Cuban-Caymanian roots. Acknowledging the deep ancestral associations that link the artist's family, and those of many Caymanians to the Isle of Pines, his fantastical ceramic art is very much the product of Cuba and Cayman's close cultural and economic ties to the sea.



Since 2010 when he started living in Cayman full time, Powery Serrano has made every effort to share art with all areas of the community and has also donated his work to charities such as the Cayman Islands Cancer Society. He keeps his Caribbean heritage the forefront of his art, which has been featured in multiple shows, including a recent solo exhibition at the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands in 2021.

Simon Tatum received his Bachelor of Art degree from the University of Missouri (USA) in 2017, and a Master of Fine Arts Degree in Sculpture and Expanded Media from Kent State University (USA) in 2021. Tatum's thesis showcase, titled The Romantic Caribbean, featured at the Kent State University's CVA gallery in March 2021, and he has shown a solo exhibition within the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI) titled Looking Back and Thinking Ahead. He has also participated



in many group exhibitions including Arrivants: Art and Migration in Anglophone Caribbean World at the Barbados Museum and Historical Society and the Sense of Place exhibition at Spinnerei Halle 18 in Leipzig, Germany.

Tatum was honoured in 2016 with an international travel grant from the NGCI to attend the Caribbean Linked IV residency programme in Oranjestad, Aruba. Moreover, he is also the first graduate scholar sponsored by the Peter N Thomson Family Foundation in Grand Cayman to pursue a graduate programme.

Alongside his studio art practice, Tatum is developing skills in art administration and writing. He has previously worked with the NGCI and the Kent State School of Art Galleries and Collection. He currently works within Studio Campos-Pons in Nashville, TN, USA.

STAR FOR CREATIVITY CERTIFICATE

Cayman Art Week (CAW) is a weeklong curated programme of exhibitions, art galleries, open studios, art tours and late-night art events across the three Cayman Islands that was launched in July 2021. Created to help offset the impact of the pandemic on the creative sector, CAW was designed to stimulate the Caymanian creative economy and to celebrate Caymanian creativity by drawing to together an unparalleled collection of 27 commercial galleries, pop up exhibitions, and studio spaces.



CAW's annual event is supported by a web platform and social media calendar that profiles all commercial art spaces in the Cayman Islands in one comprehensive space enabling a singular point of access to, and information about, these venues throughout the year. Cayman Art Week was launched by Natalie Urquhart (founder), and executed by a volunteer team comprised of Urguhart, Caroline Schroder, Pam Brown and Meegan Ebanks, with support from Susan A. Olde, OBE (CAW Patron), Colin Lumsden, Isy Walton, Katie O'Neil and Melanie Cumber. The entirely free event was supported by core partners Provenance Properties Cayman Islands, George Town Revitalisation (and NYSA), the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands, and MC2 Design Group, along with support-in-kind from local businesses. The long-term aim for Cayman Art Week is to develop as an annual event that supports the growth of a viable art market in the Cayman Islands by cultivating local and international collectors, as well as supporting the arts community through online programming.

Staff of the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands for their Digital Programming Initiative

Following the COVID-19 lockdown in March 2020, the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI) had to shut its doors to the public. In order to continue providing the community with access to locally produced art, culture, and educational activities throughout, NGCI's staff rapidly adapted by making almost all of its services available online, as part of a new Digital Engagement Programme.




This included, but was not limited to: four virtual online exhibition experiences, several of which were included in a line-up of top global virtual exhibitions alongside the Louvre Museum (Paris) and the Metropolitan Museum of Art (NYC); the new NGCI Collection Online Project, which saw 200 artworks from the National Gallery Collection uploaded to a digital archive with related interpretation materials and artist biographies (making this the most comprehensive archive on Caymanian art anywhere); the new National Gallery Online Exhibition Archive; several 'digital-only' exhibitions that shared the community's response to lockdown including Art Under Lockdown; and a programme of tri-weekly downloadable art activities relating to STEAM topics to ensure students from all corners of Cayman could still celebrate art and culture in a very difficult time.

With the new digital programme being supported by an active social media campaign uptake was extensive and, despite opening doors in July 2021, NGCI remains committed to responding to the needs of its in-person and online audiences by working in a hybrid capacity permanently.

Marc and Pam Laurenson are the co-founders of **Stoak'd**, an illustration, art, and design collective. Working principally in pop art-inspired style, the Laurensons' practice embraces a wide range of artistic styles and media, from painting and sculpture to graphic design and working with found and recycled materials.

Stoak'd has won numerous awards since its inception and the Laurensons' work has been widely shown in galleries




and featured in editorials and magazines, including the cover of the Cayman Airways Skies in-flight magazine (2019), 1340 Art International Magazine and most recently in Forbes (2020) for their artwork created from recycled materials – *COVID-Self Portrait* – which has been added to the Permanent Collection of the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI)

Stoak'd has won two Poinciana Festival awards (2013 and 2014), exhibited in the KAABOO Cayman Music, Arts and Food Festival (2019), featured in the National Gallery's exhibitions *Cross Currents: First Cayman Islands Biennial* (2019), *Art Under Lockdown* (2020, virtual) and *Island of Women* (2020). The most recent art exhibition was *Consumed* (2020), presented as a solo exhibition by Marc Laurenson at the NGCI.

VISIONARY AWARD

As the Cayman Islands foremost visual artist, **Bendel Hydes** is rightly recognised as the founding father of contemporary art in the Cayman Islands. During his 50-year career as a professional artist, he has carried the torch for Caymanian culture both locally and overseas, exhibiting his work in prestigious art institutions, including the Commonwealth Institute in London and the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C., while also featuring in several of the most prominent international exhibitions of Caribbean art.



Hydes was instrumental in co-founding the National Theatre, the precursor to the Cayman National Cultural Foundation (CNCF), and the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI). He has also taught numerous artist's workshops at both CNCF and NGCI, helping to teach the next generation of Caymanian artists. In 2004 Hydes was made cultural attaché to the United States, serving as a cultural ambassador for our islands and helping to further support the promotion of Caymanian culture overseas.

Within art historical circles, the importance of Hydes' work is reflected by his inclusion in seminal publications on Caribbean art and artists. He also has the distinction of being the only Caymanian artist to receive a FULL career retrospective at the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands in 2019, which was accompanied by a 200-page scholarly publication.



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

Marley's 77th celebrated globally

Reggae fans worldwide celebrated Bob Marley's 77th birthday on Sunday and in his Jamaican homeland his family ensured his legacy continues to thrive with a series of events.

Marley died in 1981, aged 36, from cancer. Events and exhibitions are being staged worldwide to mark his birthday, including in the UK where a memorabilia exhibition recently opened at the Saatchi

Gallery in London. Toronto City Council celebrated Bob Marley Day again on Sunday, its 31st consecutive year.

The theme for this year's Jamaica celebrations was Roots 77 with seven main events over seven days. They included a beach clean-up, a sound clashes, music industry seminars, two art installations, and two concerts. Fans worldwide were invited to join the festivities by tuning

in to the live stream of Bob Marley's 77th Earthstrong on the Tuff Gong TV YouTube channel on Sunday for seven hours.

"I am so pleased to have the opportunity to honour my dad each year - especially in a way that welcomes fans and well-wishers around the world to share this special occasion with our family," said Cedella Marley. "This year is particularly important to us with Jamaica celebrating its 60th anniversary."

One of the main attractions of the celebration is the new 'Rita Marley: Mystic of a Queen' piece. The Berette S Macaulay-curated exhibition honouring Marley's widow is a permanent fixture at the Bob Marley Museum in Kingston.

Through the Tuff Gong TV YouTube channel, Bob Marley's 77th Earthday live stream featured performances by The Marley brothers, Minister Marion Hall, formerly known as Lady Saw, Sharon Marley, and grandsons Skip Marley, Jo Mersa Marley, and Elijah Marley.

A new feature of the Bob Marley celebration is the introduction of The 7 Roots of Marley. Inspired by the seven pillars of Kwanzaa, the video meditations explore the reggae legend's ideals and give insight into his ideologies and far-reaching impact.

Julia Vaz, marketing director of the Bob Marley Group of Companies, emphasised the comprehensive nature of this year's offerings: "The goal is to provide something for everyone and to emphasise different aspects of Bob Marley's guiding beliefs and way of life. We want people to have a feel of who he was beyond his status as a reggae superstar."

True to this notion of going back to the roots, there was a sound clash titled 'Echoes of Sound Systems – When the Two 7's Clash'. It was a collaboration with the Ministry of Culture, Gender, Entertainment,

and Sports. Billed as the sound clash to end all sound clashes, it saw sound systems vie for the top prize and bragging rights. This celebration also formed part of the celebrations for Jamaica's 60th year of independence and will air weekly during reggae month on Tuff Gong TV.

Guyana oil output rises soon

Guyana is about to get even more oil wealth after Exxon Mobil announced that next month it plans to start production at its second oil platform there.

Guyana is one of Exxon's top bets for production growth. Its recent discoveries are expected to drive recoverable oil and gas volumes beyond 10 billion barrels.

Liza Deep is the first vessel. The second vessel, Liza Unity, will almost triple Guyana's production this year to 340,000 barrels of oil and gas per day from about 120,000 bpd. Exxon and partners control all output in the nascent oil nation, where production started in 2019.

An Exxon-led consortium operates the Stabroek block off the coast of Guyana.

Exxon is the operator with a 45 percent stake while US oil company Hess Corp owns a 30 percent stake and China's CNOOC holds 25 percent.

In all, the consortium has disclosed 28 significant discoveries in the country. Hess, which releases fourth quarter financial results soon, has said it expects the Stabroek block to produce 1 million barrels per day of oil and gas in Guyana by 2027.

A third floating production storage and offloading vessel, named Prosperity, is under construction and expected to deliver its first oil in 2024. The consortium plans to deploy between seven and 10 platforms in Guyana.



Trinidad compromises on carnival again

Trinidad and Tobago's world-famous Carnival season would already be well underway under normal times, with fetes and soca concerts drawing large crowds, and the early rounds of steel pan and masquerade competitions in full swing. It would all lead up to the two-day

It would all lead up to the two-day street parade on the Monday and Tuesday preceding Ash Wednesday, which falls on



'A Taste of Carnival' is an attempt to allow every sector of the Carnival community to have events at designated "safe zones". These three COVID-19 protocol-compliant venues are the Queen's Park Savannah, the traditional mecca of the local festival, and Queen's Hall, both in Port of Spain; as well as the Naparima Bowl, a performance art space in south Trinidad. They will only be accessible to fully vaccinated patrons and performers.



Trinidad and Tobago's Carnival will be truncated again

Unlike the recently staged Miami Carnival, patrons use physically distanced pods at events. Most notably, the beloved J'ouvert celebrations, which herald the start of the street festival, and the Parade of the Bands will not be on offer, but other events have already begun.

Public reaction to the news has been mixed. Not only is Trinidad and Tobago in the throes of community spread of the Omicron variant, with daily new positive cases at around 600 and an estimated 49.5 per cent of the population fully vaccinated, but an untried and scaled down version of the festival seems like fickle economics to some cultural activists.
