CRIMINALS MUST LEARN THE HARD WAY THAT CRIME DOESN'T PAY

In July 2021, Hon. Premier Wayne Panton, in response to an upsurge in the scale of the violence, convened an emergency meeting with HE Governor Martyn Roper and all members of Parliament during which they were briefed by Police Commissioner Derek Byrne on what the Premier described as "this grave situation."

"Stop the bloodshed," he pleaded following several deadly crimes.

That was 18 months ago.

Since then, what appeared to have been an initial brief lull has escalated to a worrying level with a spate of armed robberies on businesses and civilians, much of it said to be linked to illegal gambling.

In this Christmas season which is supposed to be even more of a time of goodwill than other times of the year, our community continues to be plagued by this scourge.



The reports coming from the RCIPS should be of great concern to all and sundry. This cannot be allowed to go on.

The global perception of Cayman is that of a welcoming, peaceful, tolerant and safe society. There's too much at stake; both for the safety and security of residents as well as our visitors on whom our economy and livelihoods depend.

We welcome the joint statement by HE Governor Martyn Roper, Hon. Premier Wayne Panton and Hon. Opposition leader Roy McTaggart on working together to combat the rise in robberies.

We also welcome the news that the RCIPS has deployed additional resources, both overtly and covertly, including additional Officers with firearms to protect the community and arrest those responsible for the robberies.

We also welcome the offer by Crime Stoppers of an award of up to \$25,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of these robbers.

This situation requires all hands on deck to stamp it out once and for all.

Alongside efforts to 'come down hard' on the perpetrators of these 'crimes against Cayman', we must also look into programs to steer those engaged in such a negative and dangerous lifestyle of crime onto a path of rehabilitation to make them useful, law-abiding citizens.

In the meantime, no stone must be left unturned to reverse this situation, which could quite easily spiral out of control.

We fully endorse the position adopted by the Government and law enforcement and supported by the Opposition.

"The Cayman Islands Gov-

ernment has zero tolerance towards crime and we will work with the RCIPS to prevent further escalation of any activity that incites fear and anguish in our communities. Again, we implore everyone to cooperate with the police, and proactively offer any information that could assist in ongoing investigations. We deserve to enjoy the holiday season, including shopping for gifts for our loved ones, without the fear of being a victim of crime."

Finally, to the offenders of these crimes – we join in urging you to consider the consequences of your actions.

"Our prisons are filled with persons who thought they would never be caught for their acts. Do not mistake short-term gains from these horrible and nefarious activities for success. Justice will be served and the penalties will indeed be appropriate for the level of distress and harm being caused to the citizens of our community."



16 Days of Activism against Gender Based Violence Concludes

The annual international United Nation's campaign, 16 Days of Activism against Gender Based Violence, concluded on International Human Rights Day (10 December).

In the Cayman Islands, the Gender Affairs Unit in partnership with the Family Resource Centre, hosted several successful events and training sessions as a part of the initiative.

"The Gender Affairs Unit is proud to have been involved in marking the 16 Days of Activism again this year. The activities brought together advocates and victims/survivors as well as Government agencies, academia and Non-Profit Organisations. The activities ranged from training sessions, workshops, awareness displays and outreach programmes – all of which served to help garner further concrete commitments from Government and other stakeholders in our community towards ending gender based violence," said Senior Policy Analyst, Karlene Bramwell.

Around the globe violence against women and girls remains the most prevalent human rights violation to this day. Global statistics show that more than 1 in 3 women experience gender-based violence during their lifetime and that more than 5 women or girls are killed every hour by someone in their own families. Figures also show that less than 40% of those who do experience violence ever seek any kind of help.

"These figures are startling and are only being amplified by the impact of the COV-ID-19 pandemic, effects of climate change, economic instability amongst other issues. The solutions to ending gender based violence are dynamic and include public education; attitudinal change at the individual level, as well as broader societal changes aimed at reducing structural inequalities, bias and discrimination; along with the provision of opportunities to enable people to live in safety, free from oppression, and with access to necessary resources to develop their talents and skills. We are grateful to our partners for helping make this a successful 16

Days and thankful to those participants in our community who came out to join," she continued.

Ms Vernis Bodden (73), a participant of the Women's Economic Empowerment Workshop which focused on Small Business Management, said, "I was truly motivated and inspired by this well-planned workshop. As an older woman and an entrepreneur, I left with the determination to change the world around me by continuing to grow and produce food for health and wellness".

Access to the financial and knowledge resources to assist women-owned small businesses to produce high-quality products and services are vital for those trying to rebuild their lives after the experience of gender based violence.

Minnesota-based Sun Country airlines Starts Seasonal Service to Grand Cayman

On Saturday, 17 December Sun Country airlines launched its weekly service between Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport (MSP) and Owen Roberts International Airport in Grand Cayman (GCM).

The Minnesota Metropolitan Airports Commission joined representatives from Sun Country and the Cayman Islands Department of Tourism at MSP for a gate side celebration before the inaugural flight. The celebration included a ribbon cutting ceremony, and photo opportunities for passengers.

The Sun Country plane was greeted upon landing with a 'shower of affection' and passengers were treated to a selection of local treats and beverages as well as a steel pan serenade and an appearance by Sir Turtle.

Sun Country adds to the destination's airline seat capacity which has increased by 1,253 seats in the fourth quarter of

Law will stem flow of Cuban migrants



► Cayman Coast Guards are extremely busy

The Cayman Islands Government is about to pass legislation to make asylum claims more difficult for irregular migrants and speed up the slow and expensive process.

Diplomatic talks were held in early December between the Cayman Islands Government and a delegation from Cuba to discuss the alarming increase of migrants landing on Cayman shores. The talks included strategies aiming for greater search and rescue coordination to save lives, shortening the time it takes to return migrants to Cuba and targeting of human smugglers for prosecution.

Soon after, the Cayman Islands Coast Guard Operation's & Rescue Coordination Centre received a call on 14 December from the MV Hellespont Pride ship reporting that they found eight Cuban nationals adrift around 35 miles south of mainland Cuba

Cayman coast guards contacted the Cuban Border Guard who picked up their

compatriots from MV Hellespont Pride 13 miles from Port of Santiago de Cuba and were returned to Cuba.

Chris Saunders, the Border Control Minister, brought an amendment bill to parliament on 19 December. He said the number of Cubans now arriving was creating a crisis, and changes to the law could reduce the time they remain here and deter others from coming.

The cost of accommodating and repatriating Cuban asylum seekers may be as much as \$3 million this year. Amending the legislation will expedite the processing of their applications.

Saunders said: "We are in the midst of a crisis, with serious economic and security implications," noting that there are currently more than 350 migrants in immigration, which takes on average nine months to process. "The significant increase in arrivals is putting a severe strain on the Customs and Border Control Agency, both in Grand Cayman and in Cayman Brac."

The spike in arrivals this year is compounded by all migrants now claiming asylum. Saunders said it takes more than nine months to fully process, despite the memorandum of understanding with Cuba which was designed to cut down the time migrants stay before being repatriated. The amendments to the Customs and Border Control Act, he said, are designed to streamline the asylum process while still adhering to international obligations.

"It is imperative that we shorten the average length of stay," he said. "The magnitude of the financial burden is directly related to the length of time that a migrant remains in the Cayman Islands.

"Almost all migrants arriving in the Cayman Islands exercise the ability to apply for asylum and the right of appeal," he said.

He said that it costs \$1,300 per month for each migrant and an average total of \$11,700 from arrival to departure, which does not include the cost of repatriation.

Saunders said that as the economic situation in Cuba deteriorates, since April, 360 undocumented migrants have landed in Cayman, 100 of them in October alone, and arrivals continue as seven more men arrived in Cayman Brac as he was presenting the bill.

Expressing his support for the bill, Deputy Governor Franz Manderson explained why the Cayman Islands could not just give the migrants food and water, fix their boats and send them on their way, as some people in the community have suggested. He said they would be running the risk of "being branded as a country of being supportive of illegal immigration because that's what we would be doing - and we certainly wouldn't want anyone doing that to us".

Manderson also noted safety concerns in sending people on rickety boats out to sea, which was "putting persons' lives in jeopardy". He said that Cayman was mindful of its international obligations and doing "the responsible thing".

Queen's Platinum Jubilee Stamp Issue presented to HE the Governor

On 29 November, His Excellency The Governor Martyn Roper received a framed set of the Cayman Islands Postal Service's special commemorative stamp issue celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Featuring a series of black and white photographs of HM The Queen from the early years of her reign after her accession to the throne in 1952, the Cayman Islands Platinum Jubilee stamp issue consists of a set of four stamps in denominations of 25¢, 80¢, \$1.50, and \$1.60 plus a First Day Cover valued at \$4.95.

At the presentation, HE Governor Roper said, "This stamp issue was certainly a lovely tribute to Her Late Majesty The Queen from the Cayman Islands Postal Service as the United Kingdom and the

Overseas Territories celebrated her historic 70-year reign. As with the outpouring of affection after Her Late Majesty's passing in September, it was an appreciated expression of the esteem and respect many people in our Islands hold for our long-serving and devoted late monarch."

Postmaster General Sheena Glasgow said, "The commemorative stamp issue celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee has proven to be very popular. Her Late Majesty The Queen has been featured in several Cayman Islands stamp issues, and each has proven to be of unique interest to stamp collectors from around the world."

Examination & Graduation Fees Removed for Caymanian Students

The Ministry of Education (MoE) an- facilitate a more inclusive graduation nounces the removal of examination and graduation fees for Caymanian students enrolled in government schools.

The new measures, which take effect on 1 January 2023, are consistent with the Broad Outcome of improving education to promote lifelong learning and greater economic mobility for Caymanians set out in the Cayman Islands Government's (CIG) 2022-2024 Strategic Policy Statement.

"The removal of these two financial burdens will enable us to provide greater support for our Caymanian students; experience and provide a clearer pathway for students to pursue post-secondary education or gainful employment," said Minister for Education, Hon. Juliana O'Connor-Connolly.

" As we take these final steps towards free education, we can further ensure that each Caymanian student has an equal opportunity to advance and to realise their full potential," the Education Minister continued.

An estimated 454 compulsory-age students will benefit from the removal of examination and graduation fees annually.

Youth experiencing mental distress during holidays reminded to seek emergency care

This year's Youth Sailing Championship was one for the ages. Cayman sailors were pushed to the brink of their sailing limits over two days of competition. In what most described as 'on the verge of survival mode' conditions; thirty-nine youth sailors battled it out for 2022 sailing supremacy on the North Sound. Sailors were split across four classes of boats - Optimist Green (beginners), Optimist Championship (advance), Hartley 12 (double hander) and International Laser Class Association 4 (ILCA 4) (single handed). In the end, reigning Hartley champions Molly DeSeram and Stella Dean were the only ones to successfully defend their title and three new champions were crowned.

Saturday was the windiest of the two days, sailors had to contend with 20 knot gusty winds from the North northeast, coupled with the infamous North Sound chop, which made sailing on the day an arduous task, especially on the upwind legs. But these conditions only strengthen the sailors resolve. Race officer Peta Adams who had a front seat view of the action said, "I was in awe by

what I saw from the sailors today".

In the optimist championship fleet (15yrs and under), there was a hardfought battle between Cameron Lloyd, Bronwen Burt and Russell Wilson. Cameron led the first day with two bullets and both Bronwen and Russell had one a piece. They would go into the final day on 6, 9 & 9 points respectively. Bronwen took the fight to Cameron on Sunday, tying up the points with two bullets of her own, which meant that it was all to play for going into the final race. Ebba Collins, who had a remarkable day two, took first place in the final race closely followed by Cameron. Cameron was crowned optimist champion with 10 points, Bronwen second place on 11 and Russell third place on 14. In the beginner's optimist class, Red Bay Primary student Zaiden Doctor took first place, followed by Harrison Hewitt and Alexander Butterworth.

In the ILCA 4 fleet there was another three-way battle between Allie Capasso, Lyndon Pickering and Victoria Rowlette for the championship going into the final race of the day. With just

one point separating 1st and 2nd, and one between 2nd and 3rd, it was all dependent on the final race. In the end it was Allie who was unfazed by the pressure and sailed her way into first place to take the championship. Even though Victoria finished ahead of Lyndon in the last race (which meant that they were tied on points after their discarded race), Lyndon was awarded second overall because he had more first place finishes than Victoria; this was in accordance with 'The Racing Rules of Sailing Appendix A'.

Hartley 12 Defending champions, Molly and Stella were the standout performers at this year's event, finishing the regatta with six bullets from 7 races. This was the third consecutive championship across two fleets that dynamic duo has won. Most improved sailor of the year, Claudia Bullmore and her crew Dominic Gunn were second, followed by Nicholas Sved and Kaden Ramos in third.

The Cayman Island Sailing Club would like to thank all sailors, parents, volunteers, and the coaches for making this event a huge success.

Public Health Clinic in Cayman Brac moving to new location



Cayman Brac's Public Health Clinic, formerly at Faith Hospital, will be relocating to the Medical Wing at the Aston Rutty Civic Centre starting January 4th 2023.

"The Aston Rutty Medical Wing location has been used by Faith Hospital for many years", stated Dr. Srirangan Velusamy, Director of Sister Islands Health Services. 

Apex and Marella Discovery 2. On Thursday there was Carnival Sunrise and Celebrity Beyond. On Friday it's the turn of Caribbean Princess, Disney Magic and MS Insignia.

Most passengers are escaping the terrifying wintry conditions of the 'bomb cyclone' in the States that has affected 240 million Americans and Canadians, linked to at least 22 deaths. More than 1.5 million people lost power and thousands of flights were cancelled since Thursday.

The vast storm extends more than 2,000 miles (3,200km) from Texas to Quebec. Even Florida was affected with unusually freezing temperatures.

In contrast, cruise passengers in the tens of thousands are flocking to Grand Cayman. Besides touring the island, they can go barefoot in the sand, beach horseback riding, enjoy the best scuba diving and snorkelling, get up close and personal with the stingrays and turtles. They can even go to Hell.



CCMI Scientists Dive Deep to Study Coral Adaptation

What CCMI scientists hope to learn from corals found in the deep

CCMI's researchers and partners from the University of Haifa, Israel, are using specialized equipment and new methods which they have developed to study how corals can adapt to climate change.

Led by CCMI's Director of Research, Dr. Gretchen Goodbody-Gringley and University of Haifa Professor, Dr. Tali Mass, this team of scientists are seeking answers by studying corals living down to 50 m of depth on the reef walls of Little Cayman. Using both open- and closed- circuit technical scuba diving gear, they are investigating what adaptations have enabled certain corals to survive across broad environmental gradients. With this information they hope to understand how the capacity for corals to change and respond to depth may give insight into their overall adaptative potential and ability to survive in the face of future climate change.

Dr. Goodbody-Gringley explained, "We know that some species of corals are capable of living under very different environmental conditions; you can see examples of this all along the reef walls of the Cayman Islands. The same species of coral can look very different when they grow 10 meters underwater versus 50 meters, because those individuals have had to adapt to survive given different conditions like light availability, temperature variability, and nutrient flow. But little is known about exactly how they do so. If we understand the mechanisms of coral adaptation, maybe we can help more corals survive in the face of rapid, human-caused climate change."

This project began earlier this year with scientists photographing and collecting samples from corals at various depths to get baseline information on genetic composition, physiology, and skeletal structure. They will next cross-transplant selected individual corals between deep and shallow reefs, documenting changes in these corals over the course of a year, including genetic alterations, skeletal differences and variations in the number of symbiotic algae present in the corals, which they depend upon for food. Supported by the US National Science Foundation-Binational Science Foundation of Israel (NSF-BSF), researchers are also comparing the data gathered from this



in the Red Sea and the Mediterranean Sea for a wider basis of understanding.

Researchers also want to understand if these changes are then passed on genetically to future generations. To do this, researchers will monitor larval release from these corals, collect the larvae from different depths and and then settle them under the various conveniles will subsequently be assessed for growth, survival, and variations in physiology, morphology, and gene expression.

"Human-caused climate change is subjecting corals to conditions beyond their normal limits, thus we're in a period of rapidly declining reef health worldwide. FINA Men's 50M Freestyle World Champion, Jordan Crooks received a hero's welcome and a standing ovation following his World Championship winning race in Melbourne Australia. A reception to honour the young Caymanian was hosted by the Hon. Bernie Bush and the Ministry of Youth, Sports, Culture & Heritage (MYSCH), on Wednesday night (21 December 2022). Moreover, the Cayman Islands Government announced its desire to award Jordan Crooks a sum of CI \$25,000 in recognition of being the first World Champion winner for the Cayman Islands. Further details on this award will be issued in due course as there are gov-

erning guidelines and policies to be considered.

The public ceremony was held just four days after his incredible race at the FINA World Championships. Elected officials including His Excellency the Governor, Martyn Roper; Premier, Hon. G. Wayne Panton; Deputy Premier, Hon. Christopher Saunders; Minister for Health, Wellness & Home Affairs, Hon. Sabrina Turner; Minister for Tourism & Transport, Hon. Kenneth Bryan; Parliamentary Secretaries Ms Heather Bodden and Mr. Isaac Rankine, and MYSCH Acting Chief Officer Ms Joan West-Dacres were among the well-wishers in attendance.

MYSCH's Acting Deputy Chief Officer (Youth & Sports) Ms Melissa Whorms opening remarks noted the wider significance of Jordan's victory. "Normally World Champions are those we see on television, ones that we do not know or will ever meet but with much Caymanian pride, I can say we now have a World Champion, one that is very much real and one of us. Thank you for being a role model to our youth and an inspiration to us all."

During his speech Minister Bush congratulated the 20-year-old, who boasted an astonishing 20.31 during the Championship, and tying for 4th overall on

the all-time performers list over the short course distance. His final swim in the 50M freestyle event brought home the gold for the Cayman Islands. Minister Bush also gave credit to others: "In recognising your record-making accomplishment we must also thank those who provided support over the years. Starting with your parents: Faith and Jimmy Crooks. From as far back as Jordan's mother can remember water has been part of this island boy's life. It was they who introduced you to swimming as a toddler, and they who later took you for formal swimming lessons and from competition to competition. Their love was shown in the investment of the time and money they gave to help you realise your dreams. Let us not forget your sister Jillian who is your biggest cheerleader but probably also your biggest competition in and out of the pool, always standing behind you."

Making his address, Premier, Hon. G. Wayne Panton noted that Caymanians and the government were incredibly proud of Jordan and his accomplishments. "Ladies and gentlemen, Minister Bush didn't choose Heroes Square by accident but because he knew that you are a hero to our people and to our young people in particular."

The applause as much as it goes to you Jordan it goes to your parents as well, because while we need great role models like you, we also need great role models like your parents. I can't tell you how much we all feel and love the kind of support it takes so our young people, our children, can be able achieve what you have achieved. It is an integral part of my motto of 'Community Builds Country' because it starts with the families, it starts in the communities and we build stronger countries as a result," the Premier added.

Ebanks called the gold medal and World Championship result: "An outstanding accomplishment by a phenomenal young Caymanian. The world has a population of approximately eight billion people and a young and very talented Jordan Crooks from the Cayman Islands with a population of approximately 70,000 bravely faced the best swimmers in the world and outswam them all, bar none."

Also adding his congratulations, Cayman Islands Aquatic Sports Association (CIASA) President, Mr. Stephen Broadbelt outlined Crooks' decade-long swimming career, adding: "Christmas came early for the Cayman Islands but this was not a gift given, this gift was earned by Jordan. I will remember exactly where I was when he hit that wall. I will remember that in 10 years from now in 20 years from now."

Broadbelt spoke about Jordan's determination and said that he has used Jordan's story as an example of resiliency to show what is possible if you do not give up.

Both the CIASA President and Minister Bush confirmed that for Cayman's swimmers to continue on this trajectory the much-anticipated 50M pool will need to be built and that plans and discussions for that project were already in the works before this impressive triumph.

Honouree Mr. Jordan Crooks responded from the podium with a special thanks for the support of his parents, family and close friends who helped him to achieve such an accomplishment.

After receiving a Caymanite plaque Crooks met well-wishers, signing autographs and taking pictures until the reception ended.

CHINA GRAPPLES WITH A HUGE COVID RESURGENCE

World attention is once again being focused on China over Covid-19, this time over the explosion in the number of cases following the Chinese government's forced decision recently to ease its extremely restrictive lockdowns.

Official estimates indicate that some 250 million people, almost a fifth of the Chinese population, caught Covid in the first 20 days of December.

Early in December, the communist country where the outbreak of the pandemic was first traced in 2019, started rolling back its restrictions, the longest lasting and most severe globally.

But that only came after the country was swept by a wave of protests as people objected to the state-imposed limitations on their movement and the rigorous testing requirements which had been out in place closing down entire cities and states in some instances.

The nationwide protests were the most widespread since the 1989 Tiananmen protests which were limited to a single region.

Called the "zero Covid" restrictions, the measures were aimed at restricting the spread of the virus while much of the world opened up after extensive vaccination campaigns after the pandemic took a deadly toll worldwide.

China also faced criticism from some western nations for the severity of the restrictions and their perceived impact on human rights. However, within weeks of the curbs being lifted, China which has some of the lowest Covid-19 vaccination rates in the world, is again faced with a rapidly spreading wave of infections.

The British government is advising UK travellers to China to be aware of the current situation.

"China is currently experiencing its largest COVID-19 outbreak, and there may be an increased risk of infection. You should ensure you have a supply of medication for

COVID-19 or flu-like symptoms. COVID-19 restrictions have been significantly relaxed, but some restrictions remain in place across mainland China. Even where restrictions have formally been lifted, local authorities and businesses may still require proof of a negative COVID-19 test result to access services. Although city-wide lockdowns have been lifted, further localised lockdowns may be imposed. You should check carefully before you travel, as local arrangements are liable to change at short notice."

Some international media reports state that China's National Health Commission (NHC) has stopped publishing daily Covid-19 data, amid concerns about the reliability of the figures after infections exploded in the wake of an abrupt easing of tough restrictions.

According to one global media outlet, 'the sudden halt to the reporting of daily infection and death totals comes as concerns grow around the lack of vital information made available since Beijing made sweep-

ing changes to its zero-Covid policy that put hundreds of millions of its citizens under lockdown and battered the world's second-largest economy'.

It's also reported that despite the record surge of infections, the NHC had reported no Covid deaths nationwide for four consecutive days before halting the data release. The Chinese government is said to have narrowed its definition of a Covid death, counting only those from Covid-caused pneumonia or respiratory failure.

In a special report, the Chinese state-controlled CGTN said that Chinese researchers are optimistic about the situation, with Omicron being the dominant virus for the time being.

It quotes one of the country's leading epidemiologists as saying that the proportion of severe and critical cases of the disease among all confirmed cases in China has dropped from 16.47 per cent in 2020 to 3.32 per cent in 2021, and down to 0.18 per cent a few weeks ago.

Police Recover Firearm and Ammunition, Three Persons Arrested

Police proactive operations continue in response to the recent increase in armed robbery incidents. This week, as a result of these operations, police recovered a loaded firearm and several rounds of ammunition from two separate vehicles following searches in Prospect and of a residence in North Side. Three persons have been arrested on suspicion of possession of an unlicensed firearm, as a result of the recoveries.

The three persons, two men aged 20 of Bodden Town and North Side, and a woman aged 21 of East End, remain in custody as investigations continue.

"As we reiterated in the press briefing held earlier this week, we continue to diligently pursue and investigate the persons involved in recent occurrences of violent crime," says Acting Commissioner of Police Kurt Walton. "The public will see continued examples of intensified police activity, such as what occurred in the South Sound and Prospect areas this week, as our operations continue.

The recovery of this firearm, ammunition, and the arrests of three persons, are part of our strategy of disrupting the activities of the individuals involved in these incidents. Our detectives are currently working diligently to complete investigation files which will be submitted to the Office of the Director of Public Prosecution for charging decisions. Meanwhile, our proactive teams continue to seek out other persons, vehicles, and premises involved."

Police Investigate Robbery in Cayman Brac

Shortly after 11:50PM on Thursday, 22 December, officers responded to a report of a robbery at a bar on West End East Road in Cayman Brac. It was reported that a masked man had entered the bar carrying a machete. The man took a quantity of cash from the register, along with cigarettes and personal items, and then then fled on foot. No one was injured during the incident

The suspect is described as being of solid build, about 5'7"-5'8" in height, and was wearing a light-coloured hooded sweater and dark pants.

On Christmas Eve, 24 December, a team of firearms officers conducted an operation in Cayman Brac, assisted by the Air Operations Unit and local officers. During the operation, officers arrested a man, age 40, currently residing in Cayman Brac, on



suspicion of robbery, in relation to the incident on Thursday, 22 December.

The man was further arrested in relation to burglary incidents which he is wanted for in Grand Cayman. He remains in custody as investigations continue, and is being transported to Grand Cayman.

The matter is currently under investigation and anyone with any information is asked to contact the Cayman Brac Police Station at 948-0331.

mas holiday in 2019 cost the government about \$57,000 and thousands more were spent on flight crews' stay in San Jose.

Trudeau had to fly to Jamaica on a Royal Canadian Air Force plane for security reasons, even though it's for personal travel.

CDB Approves US\$17 Million for Geothermal Energy Development in Nevis


The Caribbean Development Bank (CDB) has approved US\$17 million in financing for a geothermal energy development project in Nevis, which is aimed at reducing electricity costs, reducing carbon emissions and increasing energy security.

On Friday, December 9, the Bank's board of directors approved the grant financing for the project which will help the Government of St Kitts and Nevis pursue the drilling of up to two geothermal production wells and one injection well. The project's goal is to establish a geothermal power plant of capacity of ten megawatts, more than enough to meet all the domestic electricity demand in Nevis.

CDB's **Director** of **Projects, Mr. Daniel Best** said the project could transform the energy landscape in the twin islands of St Kitts and Nevis.

"A 10 MW geothermal power plant on Nevis can generate more than 100% of the domestic demand on Nevis. If successful, the project will go a long way to helping the Federation realise their sustainable energy goals. These include transitioning from fossil fuel-based electricity generation to entirely renewable, while expanding generation and developing an interconnection between the two islands to increase resilience by allowing for the transfer of electrical power between St Kitts and Nevis, thereby not only benefitting the people of Nevis, but the Federation as a whole" said **Best**.

If the project achieves its initial goals, it will lay the groundwork for more ambitious goals such as expanding the Federation's geothermal energy generation beyond that required for domestic use, to possibly support production and export of green energy commodities.



The project scope includes support to the Government and Nevis Electricity Company Ltd (NEVLEC) for project preparation, such as, preliminary surveys, surface exploration and environmental and social impact assessments, which are already ongoing, as well as infrastructure works, engineering, construction services and project management, and drilling services.

Funding for the project is from CDB's Special Funds Resources (SFR), allocat-

ed from funding from the Inter-American Development Bank/Sustainable Energy Facility, the Green Climate Fund and the Government of Italy.

Best highlighted the economic benefits of the project for the people and government of St Kitts and Nevis, noting that currently 97% of electricity generation in the country is dependent on imported fossil fuel.

"Like most of CDB's Borrowing Member Countries (BMCs), St Kitts and Nevis

is highly dependent on imported petroleum products to power its economy. This makes it vulnerable to external shocks such as those seen in the last six to 12 months due to the impacts of the war in Ukraine. It also consumes a large portion of its foreign exchange earnings. In 2018, fossil fuel imports reached as high as US\$43.4mn - approximately four per cent of gross domestic product. This project can help St Kitts and Nevis build a far more secure energy future."


