'JAH Mitch' Takes His Final Solo

Musicians across the Cayman Islands and the Caribbean region are reeling from the death of Caymanian Musical Icon, Mitch Ebanks, affectionately known as 'Jah Mitch', whose contribution spanned nearly six decades.

Jah Mitch passed away peacefully at his home in the District of West Bay early on the morning of 28th October only hours after a singalong with musical friends, who came together to take him out for a jam session as a way of brightening his spirits during his bout with cancer, which was well known among the musical fraternity.

Among those in a video circulating on social media featuring Mitch's last musical get together were stalwarts from Cayman's musical scene such as Guitarist Renwick Connolly and Singer Jeán Eric Smith a.k.a 'Mr. Notch', whom had been a bandmate and lifelong friend of the singer/songwriter.

"It's a colossal loss", noted Smith, who was noticeably devastated by his confidant and mentor's transition.

The two had spent years performing, recording and traveling together and audiences grew to be accustomed to seeing the musicians appearing together during performances over the past three decades.

"I was introduced to Mitch by Sean Hennings during the early nineties when my former band, which was a remnant of the 'Juveniles' had broken up.

Upon my entrance to the Silver's Night Club and Lounge at the Treasure Island Resort on the West Bay Road, I met Jah Mitch, who I had know from his musical contributions prior to our meeting and the fact that we were both from the District of West Bay."

He added that during his time with Mitch, his fondest memories includes Mitch's sense of humour - which Mr. Notch joked could make you forget the

world and all your troubles - as well as his competence.

"Mitch was the musical MD," Smith reminisced.

"In those early days we would rehearse for our shows at Silvers from 10am till 1pm and then go on to play into the early hours of the morning. Once home, we would then arrange new songs and Mitch was able to pick up chord progressions very quickly so we could rapidly add new material to the repertoire and the night became a huge success."

Mr. Notch said over the past 35 years there were only 5 shows he could remember playing without Jah Mitch.

"It is impossible to even imagine trying to replace him. There is a space there but there will never be anyone to fill it."

Among some of the songs Caymanians will remember Jah Mitch for are compositions such as 'Parade', 'Tempp' and 'Search the Town,' the latter of which is set to be released by Mr. Notch as a single as would often be the case with the duo.

"Mitch would write the songs and I

would sing them and we were the only act from the Cayman Islands to headline Reggae Sumfest in Jamaica. We went on at 4am in the morning and when we finished, the other bands wanted to recruit Jah Mitch due to his proficiency as a guitarist," said Mr. Notch.

Mitch also received a Long Service Award from the CMEA in 2016 and was an ambassador of Cayman's musical scene to both young and old musician, always encouraging them and taking the time to give advice when he could.

Another young musician to mentor under Jah Mitch was Sean Hennings, of Hi Tide, who also spoke with the Caymanian Times about the Musician and his influence on the Island's musical fingerprint.

"I was the drummer for the band at Treasure Island and initially met Mitch there.

"He had a trio that played by the pool. I always went to watch them and then Treasure Island decided that they wanted to give them an opportunity inside on the

big stage and they formed a band.

"Upon inviting me to join as the drummer, I reached out to Notch, who then became the singer," noted Mr. Hennings.

"My very first memory of Mitch was being a little child. Cayman prep had a fair day and Jah Mitch's band was playing. The band's name was 'Strong Hands of Tomorrow' and I felt like I was watching Carlos Santana.

"I was in awe of what I was seeing and then to finally being asked by them to join them was the highlight of my life."

When the band wrapped up its stint at Silvers, they ensemble moved to Houston to pursue musical opportunities, an experience Mr. Hennings writes about on his album's track, 'Sandswept Lane,' and ode to the time and place where they stayed during that trip.

Speaking of Jah Mitch's passing, Mr. Hennings noted, "It wasn't a shock but it is still upsetting. I knew of how unwell he was and the inevitable was going to happen. We didn't know when but had been preparing for it."

He described the moment of Mitch's transitioning as a massive loss.

"This guy was a premier songwriter and guitar player. So unique and the chords that he put together.... He would take a song like Yellow Bird and put Chords in it that would just blow your mind."

Mr. Hennings said he thinks Jah Mitch's legacy will be as one of the greatest songwriters out of the Cayman Islands in our history and just an all time down to earth nice and simple man.

Both he and Mr. Notch expressed the difficulty in finding the best way to honour Mitch's contribution, as it touched so many people.

"It's a tough thing that we only think about honoring the great after they are gone. We don't give that respect when they are here and we only realize the greatness when they are gone," the musicians agreed.

The event also featured discussions on Innovations in Wealth Management and Asset Protection, offering a broad range of insights for attendees across the financial services spectrum.

PIRATES WEEK SETS SAIL AGAIN!

Cayman is gearing up for a grand 2024 Pirates Week celebration with major attractions this year being District Days and the popular Gimistory.

Hon. Minister for Culture Dwayne Seymour is leading a drive to invigorate Pirates Weeks even further as a major national Caymanian cultural event and tourist attraction.

Appearing on the Cayman Conversations podcast with Ralph Lewis (publisher of Caymanian Times newspaper), Mr Seymour was gushing with optimism for this year's celebration.

Pirates Week was 'launched' in 1977.

"We're trying to transport festival goers down a nostalgic path as we look back at the history of Pirates Week over the decades

since 1977. This makes Pirates Week the actual oldest festival in Cayman, and we're celebrating 47 years of Pirates Week festivals," he explained.

Mr Seymour further pointed out that Pirates Week is "less of a celebration of piracy, and instead an annual celebration of its rich maritime history and heritage and culture of our people"

There's also a strong economic component to the event, in addition to its cultural significance.

"Over the years, Pirate Week continues to be an important economic driver for the Cayman Islands, especially during this time of the year, when we have historically witnessed a decline in tourism, and one that had been put

at the Foundation, expressed her enthusiasm, stating, "We are thrilled to continue the legacy of storytelling with this year's Gimistory Festival. Whether attendees are hearing these tales for the first time or reminiscing about stories from their grandparents, this timeless art form resonates across generations," it says on the social media page.

Minister of Culture Dwayne Seymour told Cayman Conversations that he has lobbied hard for proper funding and management of Pirates Week and its associated activities. As he succinctly put it: "Vision without funding is hallucination."

Elaborating on the need for funding and oversight to preserve and promote Caymanian culture he added: "The government needs to step up, and, you know, put their money where their mouth is, and fund culture properly. It has never been funded properly. Some don't see the vision in funding culture properly. But once you fund culture properly, then it doesn't seem like it's lost. It seems like it's lost because nothing is happening, because no one, no program is there, affording you the culture product. So, it seems like our culture is lost because we're not doing the things that we used to do. That's my opinion."

With a theme of 'Sailing through time', the Pirates Week Festival runs from November 11th to November 30th.

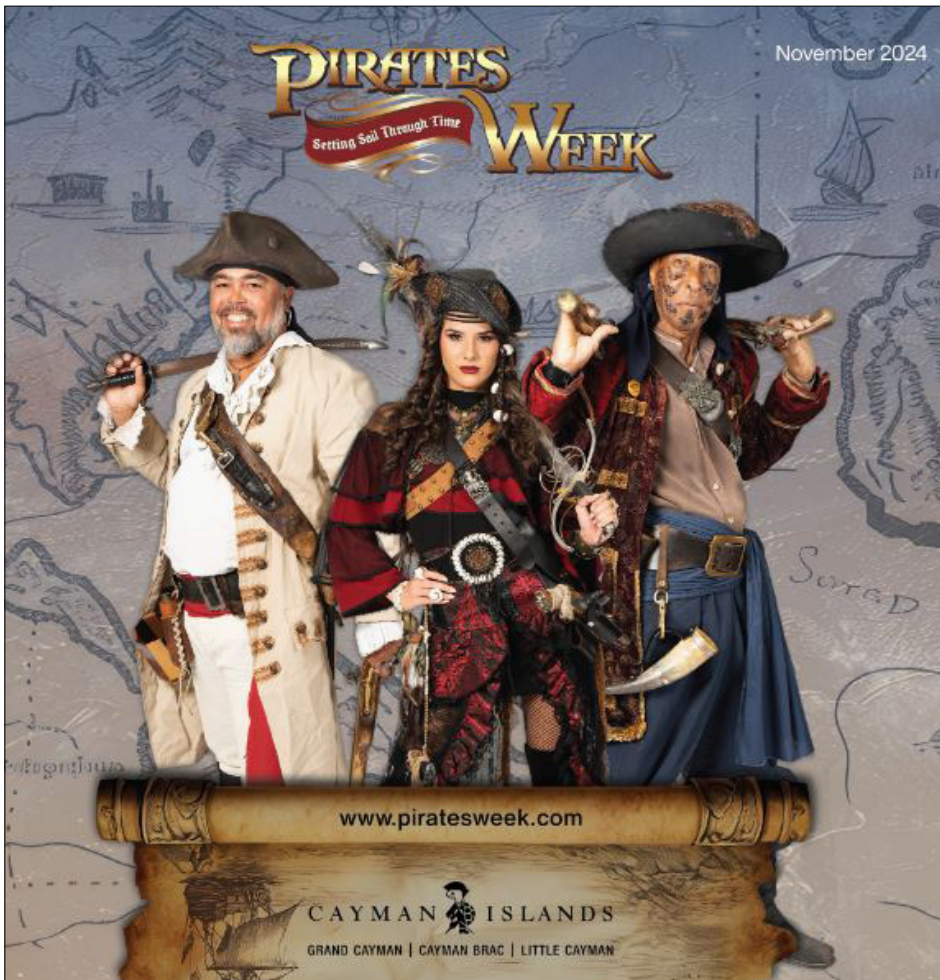

First Caymanian Appointed Dean of CYA Programme

The Cayman Islands has reached a significant milestone in youth development with the appointment of Ms. Vanessa Burke, Cayman's Female CARICOM Youth Ambassador (CYA), as Dean of the CARICOM Youth Ambassador Programme (CYAP). Ms. Burke's is the first young Caymanian to hold the prestigious role, marking a historic moment for the Cayman Islands in the programme's history.

The CYAP is a regional initiative mandated by CARICOM Heads of Government, empowers youth participants to become leaders in their communities and across the Caribbean. In her capacity, Ms. Burke will lend support for coordinating the affairs of the CYAP and for guiding her peers in their collective efforts to advocate for regional priorities, raise awareness of the role of CARICOM, and advance youth issues both locally and regionally.

Ms. Burke's appointment comes as part of a rotational process where CYAs may assume the role of Dean, serving to fulfil these leadership responsibilities. The process provides a key development opportunity for CYAs throughout the Caribbean. She will serve in this capacity until July 2025.

Reflecting on her appointment, Ms. Burke shared, "I am deeply honoured to represent my country, but even more so to amplify the powerful voice of Caribbean youth, championing their dreams, ambitions, and limitless potential."

To commemorate Vanessa's historic appointment, the Ministry of Youth, Sports & Heritage recently hosted an induction ceremony on October 16th at the Cayman Collections Centre. The event honoured Vanessa's achievement and celebrated the Cayman Islands' growing influence within the programme.

Commenting on the significance of the appointment, Head of the Youth Services Unit, Mrs. Mellony Bryan-Waugh, said, "We are incredibly proud of Ms. Burke. We are certain that she will make a pos-

The Truman Bodden Law School (TBLS) celebrated an auspicious occasion Thursday, 17 October, with an official ribbon-cutting ceremony to mark the opening of its new modern campus, located at Artemis House along Fort Street, George Town.

Esteemed dignitaries in attendance included Her Excellency Governor Ms Jane Owen, Deputy Governor Hon. Franz Manderson, Deputy Premier Hon. André Ebanks, Attorney General Hon. Samuel Bulgin, KC, Solicitor General Reshma Sharma, KC, Grand Court Judges Hon. Justice Richard N. Williams and Hon. Justice David Charles Doyle, former Leader of Government Business Mr Truman Bodden, OBE, and Director of TBLS Mr Michell Davies, BEM together with the wider staff and faculty of the law school.

"The law school has come a good modern way since the days that I studied here, since the Deputy Governor studied here, since former premiers have studied here and I am thrilled for the school and in particular I'm thrilled for our Caymanian students," noted Deputy Premier Ebanks while reaffirming the government's commitment to TBLS.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony was held four months after the law school relocated from Monaco Towers, located along Edward Street, George Town. The new larger campus now provides more lecture and

tutorial rooms along with upgraded IP connectivity, allowing staff and students greater access to TBLS' UK partner institutions, the University of Liverpool and Oxford Brookes University.

"The Law School is grateful to the Premier and the Government for its support in making the relocation possible. Staff and students have transitioned smoothly to our new home, which provides much-needed additional classroom and office space. TBLS looks forward to serving many generations of law students in Artemis House in the years to come," said Mr Davies.

Following the ribbon-cutting ceremony at the foyer of the new campus, guests were given a tour of the library, lecture and tutorial rooms, common areas and offices.

"The fact is that the law school population is growing, and it is an important institution in our educational framework and so we need to have appropriate settings and accommodations for our students and lectures so they can be more optimal in their delivery," noted Attorney General Bulgin.

Formerly the Cayman Islands Law School, the institution was founded in 1982 and later renamed in honour of Mr Truman Bodden, a former Leader of Government Business and a former lawyer by trade. Study Reveals Record Cruise Tourism Expenditures in the Caribbean and Latin America

interests of the cruise industry and destinations and stakeholders in the Caribbean and Latin America, is proud to announce that the 2023-2024 cruise year brought record economic contributions to the region. According to the study released today by Business Research & Economic Advisors (BREA), Economic Contribution of Cruise Tourism to the Destination Economies, cruise tourism generated \$4.27 billion in direct cruise tourism expenditures – about 27 percent higher than the record set by the previous study in 2018 – along with over 94,000 jobs paying more than \$1.27 billion in wage income in the 33 participating destinations.

“We could not be prouder of these results and what they mean for the lives and livelihoods of so many throughout the Caribbean and Latin America,” said Michele Paige, CEO, FCCA. “In addition to showing what cruise tourism brings to these destinations’ economies, many of the study’s findings will also serve as the foundation of building further mutual success between cruise lines and destination stakeholders.”

The study measured direct spending impacts through passenger surveys and crew surveys; cruise line spending for services and provisions; port revenues; and employment generated by cruise ship calls. Measurement of economic impacts was calculated by collecting data from local government agencies, regional development agencies and in-

ternational economic agencies to evaluate impacts on employment, wages, port fees and taxes.

Key findings include:

Cruise tourism generated \$4.27 billion in expenditures, up 27% compared to the last study in 2018 and the previous record.

94,027 jobs were supported by the industry, up 19% compared to the last study, paying a total employee wage income of \$1.27 billion.

Destinations welcomed 29.4

million onshore visits from cruise passengers, with an average spend of \$104.36, generating a total of \$3.07 billion.

Destinations also welcomed 3.9 million onshore visits from crew, with an average spend of \$58.78, generating a total of \$229.5 million.

Cruise lines spent \$968.3 million, an average of \$29.3 million per destination.

The 33.3 million passenger and crew visits represent a 13%

increase compared to the previous study, and the 31 common destinations in the 2018 and 2024 studies experienced a 17% increase in passenger visits.

Average per passenger spend increased for 26 of the 31 common destinations, and 14 destinations recorded average spend rates above \$100 per passenger (up from 12 in 2018).

On average, a single transit cruise call with 4,000 passengers and 1,640 crew generates \$369,100 in passenger and crew spending alone: \$339,800 and \$29,300, respectively.

The study’s measure of cruise tourism expenditures did not include indirect benefits of cruise tourism, including supplies purchased by tour operators, restaurants and port authorities, though the estimates of these expenditures served as the basis for total employment and wage impacts. The study also did not account for other indirect benefits, such as spending from cruise passengers who return as stay-over guests; nor did the study measure other methods of cruise line spending that benefit destinations, including NGO partnerships and marketing.

The study – which is engaged by the FCCA in partnership with its destination partners as one of many ways to foster the understanding of cruise tourism, its benefits and how to best actualize its potential – was released at the 30th annual FCCA Cruise Conference & Trade Show in St. Maarten,

further adding to the event’s focus on maximizing mutual success for all throughout cruise tourism through a series of meetings, workshops and networking opportunities between destination stakeholders and cruise executives to offer insight and develop business and relationships.

The National Gallery Opens Major Exhibition of Works by Artist/Designer Jawara Alleyne

This weekend, the National Gallery will open a major exhibition that celebrates the work of Caymanian artist and designer Jawara Alleyne, and his eponymous fashion label. Produced in collaboration with designer, and foregrounding his voice throughout, it will showcase his last three collections along with his artwork, sketch books, design archives, and imagery by leading fashion photographers.

"Jawara Alleyne: Island Underground" draws inspiration from the rich tapestry of underground creativity thriving beneath the surface of our island paradise as Alleyne seamlessly blends past and present to encapsulate the island's complex identity. Evoking references from storytelling and folklore to pirates and punk, he pays tribute to individuals who define themselves on their own terms like Ann Marie 'Hairstyle' Tomlinson, Gerald 'Bogle' Levy, and Darvin Ebanks as Captain Black Terrance of the Bloody Bay Buccaneers.

Says the artist, "I've always been inspired by a dare to be different attitude, and I wanted to reflect individuals who have inspired me to find my way of doing things... to write my own story. This collection is not only a celebration of underground culture but also an exploration of a fine art approach to fashion, where each piece is crafted with an approach that pulls on and expands a local identity. Island Underground invites viewers to see fashion not just as clothing but as a canvas for artistic expression and cultural commentary."

Speaking about the project, Natalie Urquhart, National Gallery Director and the exhibition's Curator said: "The Island Underground exhibition explores Alleyne's artwork and design process, culminating in his recent Spring/Summer 25 Collection of the same name. Informed through painstaking research into the National Art Collection, which has inspired his bespoke abstracted fabrics and unique drape work, and by revisiting Caribbean traditions of upcycling and repurposing, he seamlessly blends echoes of renowned artworks and cultural practices and infuses them with

For the Gallery, who has worked with Alleyne since he was a student and supported his studies via their National Gallery Deutsche Bank Scholarship, the exhibition is a chance to showcase and celebrate his achievements as he embarks on the next phase of his international career. For the artist, this project brings him full circle.

"Bringing pieces of my collections and sharing the sources of my inspiration in the place where it all began, is deeply personal," adds Jawara. "It's more than just fashion – it's about honouring where I come from and sharing that story with the world. The National Gallery is a sacred space for me, a place where art and culture meet. This exhibition is a way to connect my work with the people and the community that answered and supported my calling. My work goes beyond being simply inspired by culture; it engages in an ongoing dialogue with it. It's about expressing my culture and also speaking directly to it."

Cayman set to face Guadeloupe in pair of historic Concacaf Nations League matches



After securing a historic promotion in Concacaf Nations League group play, the Cayman Islands Men's National Team now turns its attention to the CNL Play-In, where it will face Guadeloupe in a home-and-away series with a trip to the 2025 Concacaf Gold Cup Prelims on the line.

Cayman will host Guadeloupe at 3 p.m. on Friday, 15 Nov. at the Truman Bodden Sports Complex for the first leg before traveling to Guadeloupe for the second leg matchup at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, 19 Nov.

"I really believe in this group and what they can accomplish," head coach Joey Jap Tjong said.

"They have already made Cayman Islands football history in this tournament and, if they play disciplined and they play

together, there's no limit on what they can achieve."

Cayman enters the CNL Play-In riding one of the most successful stretches in men's national team history. Over its last five matches, Cayman has won three times and drawn once. Cayman earlier this month earned a promotion to League B in the next CNL competition by virtue of finishing as the best second-place team in the CNL League C group stage. That finish also secured Cayman's first-ever CNL Play-In appearance.

Guadeloupe enters the Play-In after finishing fifth in its League A group. In its final group stage match, it drew 0-0 with Martinique.

After the completion of Group Stage play

for Leagues A and C, the League A fifth and sixth-place finishers — Guadeloupe and Guyana (Group A) and Cuba and French Guiana (Group B) — and the League C three group winners, Barbados (Group A), Belize (Group B), and Saint Kitts and Nevis (Group C) and the best second-place finisher, Cayman Islands (Group C), have advanced to the Concacaf Nations League Play-In.

The Concacaf Nations League Play-In consists of a home-and-away direct elimination round, where the eight participants have been divided into four matchups based on the Group Stage results. The four matchups are as follows:

PI1: Guadeloupe vs Cayman Islands (best 5th place vs best 2nd place)

PI2: Cuba vs Saint Kitts and Nevis (next 5th place vs 3rd best group winner)

PI3: French Guiana vs Belize (best 6th place vs 2nd best group winner)

PI4: Guyana vs Barbados (next 6th place vs best group winner)

After home-and-away play, the aggregate score winner in each matchup will advance to the 2025 Concacaf Gold Cup Prelims. Click here to view the full schedule.

Once again, as America votes the world watches and waits...but this time it is different. The American and global stakes have not been so high in recent times.

It's all to play for as the curtains come down and the expectation levels sky-rocket for next Tuesday's Presidential Election in the United States.

Down and dirty as the saying goes, describes one element of the closing phases of the campaign for who succeeds Joe Biden to become America's 47th president.

The world once more watches and waits with a collective bated breath. There are

major international issues at stake; the state of the post-COVID world economy, wars in the Middle East involving America's key ally Israel, the continuing war on Ukraine by Russia, NATO reassessing its role, climate change, and indications of a realignment of global power politics. With just a few days to go this US Presidential Election race is still close to call.

This year's celebration is especially meaningful, as it embraces the theme Celebrating Caribbean Legacy: A Kaleidoscope of Resilience, highlighting UWI's enduring legacy across the Region.

Kirani James is a highly accomplished athlete renowned for his success in the 400 meters. He has secured gold medals at the World Championships (2011), the London Olympics (2012), and the Commonwealth Games (2014). James began his athletic career in the small fishing village of Gouyave, St. John, where he joined the SpeedZone Club at age 13 and quickly made an impact by setting record times for his age group. His early achievements include winning gold at the CARIFTA Games in 2007, 2008, 2009, and 2010, as well as breaking Usain Bolt's U20 400m record in 2009.

Internationally, he won gold in the 400m at the Commonwealth Youth Games (2007)

and earned silver at both the World Youth Championships (2007) and the World Junior Championships (2008). He also became the first athlete to achieve a 200m/400m double at the 2009 World Youth Championships and won 400m gold at the World Junior Championships in 2010.

Mr James attended the University of Alabama on an athletic scholarship, competing under the coaching and mentorship of Olympic gold medalist Harvey Glance. He won the National Collegiate Athletic Associ-

ation (NCAA) Outdoor Championship title in his first two years and recorded a personal best of 43.74 seconds at the 2014 Diamond League, where he also claimed gold in 2011, 2015, 2022, and 2023.

James is one of nine athletes to win world championships at the youth, junior, and senior levels, solidifying his status as one of the most decorated 400m athletes in history. His accolades include three World Championship medals (Gold in 2011, Bronze in 2015, and Silver in 2022) and three Olympic medals (Gold in 2012, Silver in 2016, and Bronze in 2020), making him the first to win three individual 400m Olympic medals. He was Grenada's first and only Olympic medalist until the Paris Games 2024.

He has been named Grenada's Athlete of the Year four times and was ranked number one in the World for the 400m in 2011, 2012, and 2014. In December 2012, Caribbean Journal named James and Jamaica's Usain Bolt Co-Sportsmen of the Year.

Outside of track and field, James holds a Bachelor's degree in General Business and serves on the Board of Directors of the Windward Islands Research & Education Foundation (WINDREF) and its Sport for Health programme.

He has received several prestigious awards, including the Commander of the

Order of the British Empire (CBE), the Order of Grenada (COG), and the title of Sports Ambassador for Grenada. He was also honoured as Grenada Sportsman of the Year in 2009 and received the Austin Sealy Trophy that same year for the most outstanding athlete at the CARIFTA Games.

In his profile, James expressed, "With four Olympic final appearances, I strive to inspire others through my journey and passion for the sport. I am committed to continuous improvement and fostering a positive and supportive community for fellow athletes. I am rooted in the belief that dedication, consistency, and teamwork are key to success both on and off the track."

Pro Vice-Chancellor and Principal of the Global Campus, Dr Francis O. Severin, applauds Kirani James and welcomes this moment. CABINET APPROVES THREE SIGNIFICANT AMENDMENT BILLS TO SAFEGUARD AND ENHANCE THE RIGHTS OF CHILDREN, YOUNG PEOPLE, AND OLDER PERSONS

The Ministry of Investment, Innovation, and Social Development (MIISD) is pleased to announce that several amendment bills have been approved by Cabinet. The proposed legislative reforms aim to bolster protections for children, young people, and older persons in the Cayman Islands while ensuring they meet the needs of the community.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Investment, Innovation, and Social Development, André Ebanks, commented:

“These substantial amendment bills reflect our commitment to protecting our children, young people, and older persons. Our strength as a community is measured by the care we extend to those who rely on us for support and safeguarding. By modernising our social development legislative framework that guards many of the most vulnerable, we demonstrate our commitment to protecting the vulnerable while building a future where every person, regardless of age, can thrive with dignity and respect.”

Amendment Bills Overview:

The Older Persons (Amendment) Bill, 2024 seeks to enhance the protections and rights of older persons in the Cayman

Islands to develop an age-friendly community. It proposes strengthening the role of the Council for Older Persons in advocating for older persons. In addition, the Bill empowers and assigns, for the first time, a Department to be specifically responsible

to seek intervention orders where necessary to help older persons and to offer robust programmes focused on economic and social well-being. Importantly, it introduces new safeguards against abuse and neglect, including the establishment of an offence of abuse or neglect against an older person by someone in a position of trust. The Older Persons Tribunal is also established in this Bill and will be hear grievances in relation to infringements on the rights of older persons and the duties of mandatory reporting entities.

The Children (Amendment) Bill, 2024 brings forward crucial updates to child protection legislation. This Bill includes expansions to mandatory reporting requirements for child abuse and neglect to ensure quicker intervention. In line with these changes, the voice of the child is prioritised, especially in key decisions affecting their life.

The Adoption Bill, 2024 represents a long overdue, major overhaul of the Cayman Islands’ adoption framework. Drawing on extensive consultations in 2023 and 2024 with key stakeholders, including focus groups and extensive discussions with non-governmental organisations as well

as government agencies. This Bill modernises the adoption process, ensuring that it is more accessible and transparent. It incorporates safeguards and provisions to address and streamline various types of adoptions, both domestic and internationally, with a focus on the best interests of the child at every stage.

The Maintenance (Amendment) Bill, 2024 aims to streamline the legal provisions for child maintenance by integrating them into the Children (Amendment) Bill, 2024, creating a more cohesive and efficient approach to ensuring the financial welfare of children. This integration strengthens the legal tools available to ensure parents meet their obligations, simplifying the process for both families and the legal system.

The public consultation period is currently open until **Monday, 25 November 2024**. Community feedback is welcome as the Ministry aims to for these reforms to be fit for purpose and serve the long-term needs of the Cayman Islands.

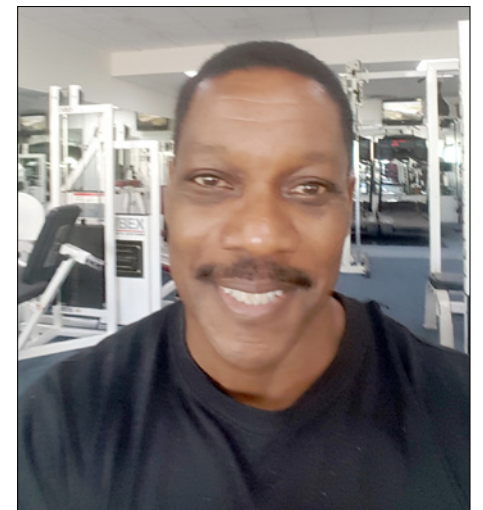

POLICE NEWS

Police investigate murder in George Town

Around 8:30PM Sunday night 27 October, police responded to the vicinity of Bronze Road, George Town, where it was reported that a man had been shot.

It was reported that the man was outside his residential address when the incident occurred, and was then transported to the George Town Hospital by private vehicle, where he was pronounced deceased by the attending doctor.

The victim, a 36-year-old man, is a Jamaican national. He has family in the Cayman Islands who have been notified.

Police units attended the scene last night, and a cordon was put in place as they carried out investigations. Officers remained on scene Monday while completing forensic assessment and collection of evidence. Police ask persons to respect the cordon and stay clear of the area.

Detectives are currently investigating the matter. It is believed that the murder was the result of a local dispute, and does not appear to be gang related. As an added precaution the community can expect to see increased police

presence and patrols in the vicinity. No arrests have yet been made, and investigators are encouraging witnesses to come forward and assist with the investigation.

Now that family has been notified, police can confirm the identity of the man who was fatally wounded in the shooting incident that occurred on Sunday 27 October in George Town.

He is, Jason Johnson, a 36-year-old Jamaican national, who was living and working in the Cayman Islands.

The police extend their condolences to the family and friends of Mr Johnson.

If anyone was a witness to this incident or has any information about the incident, police encourage persons to contact 911, or the RCIPS Major Incident Room (MIR) on 649-2930.

Crime Prevention: RCIPS Issues Reminder on Burglary Prevention Measures

The RCIPS continues to receive reports of commercial burglaries from time to time, and is taking this opportunity to remind business owners of crime prevention strategies that can help keep your business safe from these types of crimes:

-It is important to utilise appropriate security measures such as alarms and CCTV systems. But just as important is making sure that they are maintained and remain functional. For example, CCTV equipment should be checked periodically to ensure that footage is being properly stored, and that the cameras are pointing to appropriate locations such as the entrance to the business, or the cash register.

-It is best to avoid keeping a large amount of cash on hand in registers or other easily accessible places. Cash should be deposited regularly.

-Consider installing a safe to secure money which cannot be deposited right away. Ensure that it is properly secured so that it cannot easily be moved, and that



only a limited number of persons have access to it.








-Ensure that there is proper lighting both inside and outside of your property. Maintain the property to minimise the amount of potential hiding spaces there are.

-You may also consider using impact resistant film on any glass doors or windows, to make it more difficult for them to be broken through.

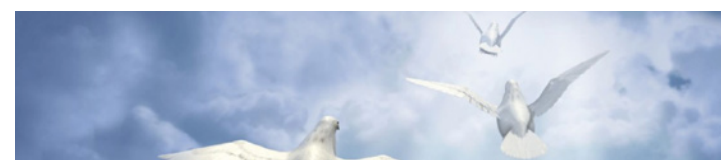
